## Caribbean Law Institute Moves Forward with Law Reform

Now in its third year, the Caribbean Law Institute recently received renewed Congressional funding of \$1.5 million for the 1990-91 year. A joint project of Florida State University and the University of the West Indies, the Institute was founded in August 1988 to promote law reform among English-speaking Caribbean nations, especially in the areas of trade, commerce and investment.

"We are very excited about what's happening," said Elwin Griffith, Executive Director of the Institute and Professor of Law at FSU. "Law reform has long been a priority, but a priority with no resources. When we committed the interest of the Caribbean nations with the resources of the Institute, we will begin to see the results of the Institute's work. However, as one of my colleagues has said, law reform is not like instant coffee. It takes a little while for the efforts to have some impact."

Most of the Caribbean countries became independent within the last twenty years. Bound by treaties of the United Kingdom, they face the necessity of establishing their own departments and agencies. The Caribbean Law Institute (CLI) seeks to educate and propose legislation which the countries can adopt or modify to serve their needs.

The Institute is governed by a six-member board of directors, currently including Talbot D'Alemberte, President and former Dean of the FSU College of Law; Sir Keith Huntte, Vice-President and Pro-Vice Chancellor of UWI; Stephen R. MacNamara, class of 1982 and Secretary of the Florida Department of Business Regulation; Elwin Griffith, Executive Director of CLI; Andrew Burgess, Dean, Faculty of Law, UWI; and Nicholas Liver-

pool, Senior Law Lecturer at UWI. Each project has reporters who are responsible for producing draft legislation for consideration by advisory committees.

Projects are underway in the areas of Arbitration, Commercial Law Survey, Company Law, OECs Treaties, Environmental Law and Shipping Legislation. Recent programs included a workshop on treaties in Barbados which was held in April at UWI and an April 27 Company Law session held during a meeting of the Caribbean Association of Industry and Commerce. Chaired by Professor Griffith, the Company Law Workshop was conducted to let people

from the commercial sector know about CLI's law reform efforts in this area.

CLI now publishes *Caribbean Law and Business*, a magazine devoted to legal and commercial developments in the area. Published three times a year, the magazine provides details of CLI's projects as well. Recently, CLI began acquiring books to establish a CLI collection within the FSU Law Library.

College of Law faculty who are involved in CLI projects are Joshua M. Morse, III - Maritime, James Alfini - Arbitration, and Donna Christie - Environmental Law. Professor Steve Goldstein serves as secretary to

the Board of Directors. Alumnus Stephen MacNamara is a member of the CLI Board of Directors. Other FSU law alums assisting with CLI projects are Peter Kramer of Steel, Hector and Davis in Miami who serves on the Arbitration Advisory Committee and James F. Heekin of Holland and Knight in Orlando who is a member of the Company Law Advisory Committee.

With renewed funding, the Institute looks forward to further progress in law reform for Caribbean nations. As Director Griffith stated, it's not like instant coffee, but it appears that the CLI's efforts are beginning to bring about needed changes.

### Professor Profile:

## CHARLES EHRHARDT

Being a native Iowan, Charles Ehrhardt had an urge to see the sun and sand of Florida. He didn't know that there was a "North" Florida so he wrote to Dean Mason Ladd to inquire about a faculty position at the new College of Law in Tallahassee. Negotiations proceeded, and when Dean Ladd offered him an Assistant Professor position, Ehrhardt accepted over the phone.

When this eager young professor arrived in Tallahassee, in the heat of August 1967, he discovered that he wouldn't be living on the beach and playing in the water. However, Dean Ladd had rented an apartment for him so he settled in and eventually grew to love the College, the University and the town so well that he has stayed for 23 years.

Ehrhardt graduated from Iowa State

University in 1962 and received his J.D. in 1964 from the University of Iowa where he was Order of the Coif and on the Board of Editors of the Iowa Law Review. Prior to coming to FSU, he served as law clerk to U.S. Court of Appeals Judge M. D. VanOsterohout and spent two years as Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Iowa.

When he arrived in 1967, Ehrhardt, along with Gil Finnell and Tony Paluzzi, joined a faculty of three professors, a Dean, an Assistant Dean, and a librarian. Over the years, he has seen the College of Law expand greatly in terms of faculty, building and programs.

"The success of the school has exceeded the expectations that everyone had in the early 60's," says Ehrhardt. "We didn't know what would happen or where it would lead. The quality of the students and faculty was unknown as was the success of the students in completing their studies and passing the bar."

Teaching is Professor Ehrhardt's great love. He lectures in the areas of Torts, Evidence, Trial Advocacy and Sports Law. Known affectionately as "Chuck" by students and peers, he has been named Professor of the Year four times, most recently sharing the honor with Professor Gey in 1989-90.

In addition to his classroom teaching,

class, the largest ever at the College of Law and therefore known as the "super class." There is also a heightened awareness of the program's availability, and proportionately more students have become interested in the internships. This interest was evidenced during the past year by full enrollment in two Clinical Orientation sections each semester.

"There is a lot of interest in practical skills training," said Daniels, "and a realization that we offer good training in the clinical programs. The programs are carefully supervised, with both good and bad practices pointed out to the interns."

More structure and additional opportunities have been added to the program. Every

## Daniels Notes Growth of Clinical Programs

"With the 'super class' reaching the end of its second year," Nancy Daniels said recently, "there will be more clinical program interns this summer than ever before in the history of the College of Law."

Sitting in her Cawthon House office on the Village Green, Daniels was reflecting on the growth since she became Director of Clinical Programs at the FSU College of Law in December 1985. An obvious indication of the program's expansion was its division two years ago when Daniels was named Director of Criminal Programs and Carol Gregg assumed the position of Director of Civil Programs.

Daniels sees the growth of the program as related to more than just the numerical increase produced by the current second year

Florida Bar, the Federal Judicial Center in Washington, D.C., and the National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada.

Ehrhardt has published extensively in the area of Evidence Law. He has just completed revisions to his book on Florida Evidence which is widely used by lawyers and judges as well as in the classroom. His article, "Tightening the Defense Against Offensive Sports Agents," was published in a 1988 issue of the FSU Law Review and reflects his interest in sports law.

In addition to his reputation as an author

Of course, the faculty and students are readily at hand but to meet the alumni, I had to take to the road. With the invaluable assistance of Michael Heekin, I had the opportunity to visit alumni in Orlando, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Miami, Pensacola, Tampa and West Palm Beach. In each community, loyal and interested alumni and friends attended receptions where we had the opportunity to visit informally with each other. At future receptions I intend not only to meet more of our alumni and friends but also to make presentations to you about the College, and in particular, its future goals. I hope all of you will take the opportunity to join with me whenever possible in hearing more about the College of Law.

This year also saw the inauguration of this *AlumNews* and I am pleased to hear so many favorable reports about it. It is important, however, that as many of you as possible communicate information to us. Inclusion in future issues of this newsletter is an extremely effective way for our alumni to spread news of their accomplishments and maintain strong ties to the College of Law.

The College continues as the "hot" law school in Florida. As of today, we are anticipating a substantial oversubscription for next year's entering class. While the programmed first year class is ideally set at 180, we may have upwards of 230 in the Fall, 1990 entering class. While we would all be delighted to increase the number of our loyal alumni, given the size of the faculty and the physical limitations of our facility, a class size of this order will present us with some unique challenges to assure we maintain our ongoing commitment to providing the best legal education.

In an earlier letter I promised that next year the Florida State Continuing Legal Education banner would fly around the state. In the next few months, a program will be mailed to each of you detailing our extensive offerings for next year, including a program from yours truly.

Lastly, someone asked me recently as my first year comes to a close: "Are you having fun?" You bet I am!

Moving from a Southern law school to partnership in a Philadelphia law firm is a big step. Alaine Williams has done just this and now is a member of the firm of Walters, Willig, Williams and Davidson where she specializes in the area of union-side labor law, particularly on behalf of public employees. She became a partner in 1985 and recently became a named partner.

"I feel that I was very fortunate to find this firm," says Alaine. "It is a very supportive environment. Of nineteen attorneys, eight are women, and four of the eight partners are women." Alaine works two-thirds time and is one of two part-time partners. She feels that the law firms will only gain from assisting women to work part-time.

Alaine's interest lies in the area of labor law. The firm represents all public employees in Pennsylvania, and Alaine does injunction work and handles appellate cases at both the state supreme court and intermediate appeals court levels. Her work in the labor law area is the culmination of a long-time interest in assisting public employees.

"I feel that my experience in government has paid off well," Alaine stated. "Combined with a legal education specializing in labor law, it has allowed me to concentrate on an area which I enjoy."

Through her work in the public sector with the Florida Human Relations Commission, Alaine gained a good understanding of public employment.

She was Assistant Director of the Commission and served as Acting Executive Director from January to June 1974 prior to entering law school.

A 1979 Honors graduate of the College of Law, Williams was Editor of the Law Review and a recipient of the Tubbs Memorial Award for commitment to public service. She feels that the excellent education she received at FSU gave her a good foundation and allowed her to go forward and receive her LL.M. in Labor Law from Columbia University School of Law in 1980.

With experience and education in hand, Alaine was prepared for her legal career but credits her husband, Professor Robert Williams, with instructing her on how to be a good lawyer and providing her with excellent support. Williams demonstrates a great deal of pride in his wife's legal accomplishments as well as in her ability to handle two small children and a flourishing career.

Active in the Philadelphia Bar Association, Alaine was Chairperson of the Labor Law Committee in 1986. She has spoken at a number of seminars and workshops on topics ranging from Aids in the workplace to women's legal rights and comparable worth. Alaine feels that her time at FSU was crucial and profitable, enabling her to move from state government into law. She enjoys her labor law practice and is pleased to be a "Philadelphia lawyer."

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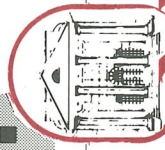

Third year law students David Corry and Ricardo Reyes won the National Products Liability Competition, March 17 in Cincinnati, Ohio. The victory was FSU's ninth national moot court championship in twelve years and the eighth quarterfinal-or-better finish for this year's team. The Cincinnati competition simulated arguments before the U.S. Supreme Court with Federal Appellate Court judges deciding the final round. Corry, the team president, and Reyes argued a hypothetical appellate case about an automobile manufactures liability.

intern has both a supervising lawyer and a faculty supervisor. The students keep daily learning journals, and each student is visited three times per semester. In addition to the State Attorney and Public Defender internships, opportunities are available through the U. S. Attorney, Appellate Public Defender and the Criminal Appeals Section of the Attorney General's Office.

There are 43 interns in the Criminal Clini-

cal Program this summer. To provide adequate supervision for the increased number of interns, six additional staff members have been hired. These include Professor Larry George, three legal writing instructors and two lawyer adjuncts.

Daniels is pleased with the growth and success of the Clinical Programs, but she misses the "real world" of the criminal area and decided in January to seek the office of Public Defender in the Second Judicial Circuit. She sees the position as a natural extension of her career experience.

After serving as Central Staff Law Clerk in the First District Court of Appeal upon her graduation from the FSU College of Law in 1977, Daniels was an Assistant Public Defender in the Trial Division for four years. She then held the position of Project Director for the Florida Public Defender's Advanced Advocacy Project before joining the faculty of the College of Law.

"I feel that my experience has given me the qualifications to be a good, competent Public Defender for our community," said Daniels. "Although I have assisted the Public Defender's Office in a pro bono capacity, I miss the case work."

Daniels looks forward to new challenges, but she admits that she would miss the students as she loves working with them. This is evident in her efforts to improve the clinical programs at the College of Law so that students will be provided with a valid

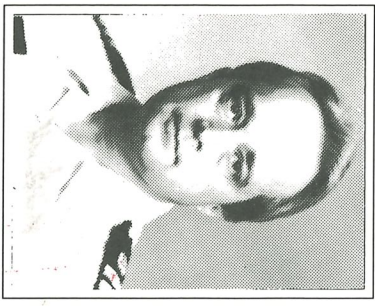

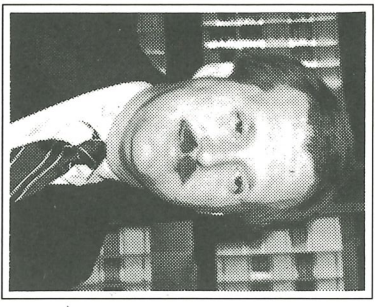
