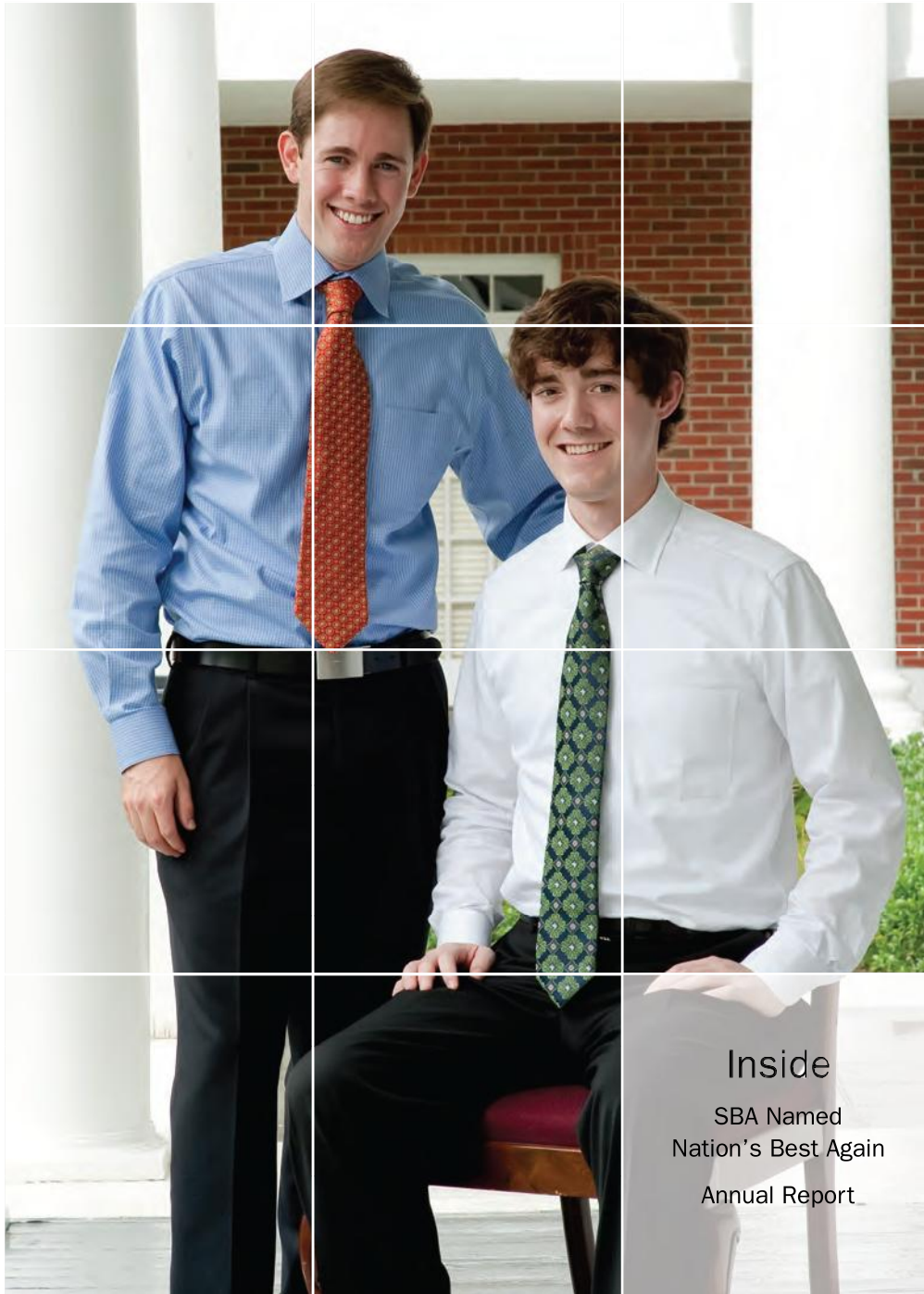

Unlike many law schools around the state and nation, we continue to have some wonderful news to report. Several important rating agencies and student outcomes rank us higher than ever before. This year's overall ranking of 52nd by *U.S. News & World Report* is an all-time high for us. Also this fall, *Hispanic Business* magazine gave us their highest ranking ever when they rated us the nation's 3rd best law school for Hispanic students. Now that the results of this summer's Florida bar exam are under our belt, we can proudly say that we have been #1 on that exam for five of the last eight times it has been administered. Given that there have been 10 accredited law schools in Florida whose students have been taking the test (an eleventh — Ave Maria — has just come on line), this is a feat of which we are quite proud. And we are all thrilled that the American Bar Association Law Student Division in August rated our Student Bar Association the "SBA of the Year" for the second year in a row.

Last year's greatest success was in placing our 2008 graduates. Despite the declining economy, 98 percent of the Class of 2008 was placed within nine months after graduation. We were all thrilled and relieved and grateful for all the alumni support that made the wonderful outcome possible. However, the market has continued to decline in an historic way. We have now turned our attention to the Class of 2009 and to our 3Ls and 2Ls. We still need to place many of our 2009 graduates and our 3Ls and 2Ls are also sailing into rough seas.

it can be extremely encouraging for a student simply to get a few words of friendly advice from an alum in a community or specialty to which the student aspires. This is especially true of our students who have out-of-Florida destinations in mind. The number of these students has increased as our reputation has grown. Finally, please volunteer to be a Placement Mentor, that is, someone who volunteers simply to take a few calls to help counsel students on their job hunts. STUDENT BAR ASSOCIATION NAMED NATION'S BEST – AGAIN!

Thousands of attorneys from around the nation descended on the Windy City this summer for the American Bar Association's Annual Meeting. Also in Chicago for the event was a small group of Florida State University law students. They were there to network and to attend the ABA Law Student Division meeting on August 1. When the meeting was over, Florida State University College of Law's Student Bar Association (SBA) had been honored as "SBA of the Year" for the second year in a row.

When considering the criteria evaluated by ABA Law Student Division leaders – programs and events, communication with the student body, improvements to the school, leadership and interaction with school administrators and faculty members – it should come as no surprise that Florida State Law was selected the nation's best SBA in 2008 and 2009.

During the past two years, the student-led association has sponsored a diverse slate of events. From social and networking activities to philanthropic events to sessions focused on reducing law student stress, all SBA-sponsored events are planned with a wide variety of students in mind. SBA also sponsored and helped organize events to raise money for children in Sierra Leone and amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) research.

The organization created an innovative Web site in 2007 to communicate with students and has been instrumental in improving law school facilities. SBA students helped design the recently renovated student lounge and improved outdoor study areas. SBA leaders also

meet weekly with Dean Don Weidner on behalf of the student body to discuss methods to improve the law school.



“Not every SBA could win the award – there is no way you can become the best in the nation without having a supportive administration behind you,” said Ben Gibson ('08), who was president of SBA during the first year for which Florida State was given the award. “These awards say a lot about SBA, but they say so much more about Florida State Law. You have an administration that is supportive, you have a faculty that is supportive, you have a student body that is amazing, and that is why you win these awards. You could not achieve such great things without an environment to do it in.”

Having been involved in SBA since

his 1L year, Gibson was well prepared to earn national recognition for Florida State. He credits his predecessors – Matt Agüero ('08) and Kareem Spratling ('06) – with putting the organization in the position to excel.

“Matt really had a desire to transform SBA and to make it not just an organization that planned socials, but make it an organization that serves students,” said Gibson, who works for the Republican Party of Florida. “He deserves a ton of credit and Kareem does, too. I learned a great deal from Kareem.”

Based on work started when Agüero was president, Gibson began his presidency with a list of seven priorities reflecting what students wanted from SBA. Those seven issues were the focus of his entire term.

“We had an overall goal to be the best SBA in the country – from day one,” said Gibson. “Our theme was, we want to take SBA from good to great.”

By the end of Gibson's term, SBA had sponsored a Homelessness Awareness Week, established a speakers bureau and hosted speakers including state lawmakers and U.S. Senator Mel Martinez ('73), and helped the law school achieve an unprecedented student giving rate – which was surpassed the following year with SBA's assistance. Gibson also served as Vice Chair of Student Bar Associations,

Marcos Gonzalez: A Cuban-American Success Story

Marcos Gonzalez was 12 years old when he came to the United States from Cuba during the Mariel Boatlift. Traveling with his parents and sister, Gonzalez was one of 125,000 Cuban refugees who fled to Florida by sea between April and October of 1980.

The relocation was difficult because Gonzalez did not speak English when his family settled in West Palm Beach. He credits his school's bilingual program with helping him learn the language in just a few years.

"Once I got into college six years later, I was still learning the language," said Gonzalez, who attended Palm Beach Community College and Florida Atlantic University before graduating from Florida State Law in 1998. His wife Ileana was one of the bilingual students at his middle school who helped translate for Gonzalez and approximately 30 other boatlift refugees in his class.

Mastering English relatively late in life did not prevent Gonzalez from becoming successful in a profession that relies heavily on the spoken and written word. Gonzalez is one of his community's most prominent attorneys, having built Gonzalez & Garcia from the ground up into a 12-attorney firm. The personal injury, workers' compensation and criminal defense firm has grown so much since Gonzalez struck out on his own in 2000 that it recently purchased and moved into a 16,000 square-foot building in West Palm Beach.

Gonzalez's commitment to the community in which he grew up is steadfast. He returned to West Pam Beach immediately after earning his law degree so he could give Hispanics in his community greater access to legal representation.

Although his first job was with a workers' compensation and personal injury firm that specialized in defense work, Gonzalez also represented plaintiffs as long as there were no conflicts of interest. Within six months of passing the bar, Gonzalez had a client list of about 100. "And that was turning away about 50 percent because of conflicts," said Gonzalez.

A year after earning his law degree, Gonzalez opened his own firm so he would not have to turn away so many clients. To date, his firm has handled more than 8,000 cases. Although he has obtained millions of dollars for his clients, quality is more important to Gonzalez than quantity.

“I’m very proud of the fact that the majority of our clients are referrals from former clients and from family friends I’ve helped in the past,” said Gonzalez. “We tend to not just focus on the big money personal injury cases because I get a lot of gratification out of getting someone who has a small case some money in his pockets.”

Gonzalez’s primary focus at his firm had been on marketing and administrative matters, but he recently has taken on more cases due to the recent semi-retirement of his friend and law partner, Randall Porcher. Gonzalez believes his most important function is meeting with all prospective clients the same day they call if at all possible. His days also involve attending hearings, conducting depositions and fielding numerous phone calls from clients and adjusters.

Although he has plenty of work to keep him busy at the office, his time spent there is not all law-related. Gonzalez begins each day with a 7 a.m. boxing workout at his firm. The same trainer he worked with when he was an amateur boxer puts him through the paces every morning to help Gonzalez stay in shape and relieve stress. He practices the same skills he learned as a young man; skills that Gonzalez believes help him as an attorney.

“Those experiences that I gained

in the boxing ring help me out in my professional life today, especially when dealing with opposing attorneys and insurance companies,” said the former golden glove boxer, whose last amateur match was a charity event he participated in as a law student.

Like many people who grew up in Cuba, boxing and baseball are passions for Gonzalez. Being a Florida Marlins

season ticket holder is one way Gonzalez is passing on his love of baseball to his son Marcos, Jr. The seven-year-old attends every game with his father and knows all the players’ numbers. Gonzalez and his wife also are the proud parents of a daughter, three-year-old Isabella.

The father of two credits his parents with making him the man he is today. His father, Marcos, worked for 20 years as a custodian for Palm Beach County Schools and his mother, Cari-

dad, worked at an electronics assembly factory.

“I was aware of the effort my parents made, leaving their entire family in Cuba so they could give their children a better life,” said Gonzalez of what motivated him growing up. “I certainly did not want their efforts to go to waste. I had problems learning the language and there were times when I became discouraged. It would have been somewhat easy for me to stop getting a formal education, but I would always remind myself of the sacrifices my parents made and that kept me striving for the B.A. and the law degree.”

When Gonzalez returned to Cuba last year for the first time in 29 years, it reminded him how life-altering it was for his family to move to the United States.

“I saw some of my very bright childhood friends,” said Gonzalez. “Because of the political system, they really have no future. It made me really grateful for the decision my parents made. And I appreciate the opportunities that the greatest country in the world offers.”

Additionally, Gonzalez is thankful that he attended law school and encourages others to earn a law degree.

“Do not let the cost of legal education get in the way,” recommends Gonzalez, who recently increased to \$100,000 a gift he had made to the law school to benefit financially needy students. “I didn’t think I had the means, but Florida State is a great school and bargain. It is important for those who have the means to give to the law school – to help those who don’t. It changes a person’s life to go to Florida State law school.” ■

Mallory Works and Plays Hard

Although Sherri Denton Mallory used to be a Gator – she majored in computer science at the University of Florida – she now dons garnet and gold when attending Florida State University football games in Tallahassee. Mallory was accepted to the law schools at Florida State and the University of Florida, but chose to study law in Tallahassee because it was closer to her hometown – Panama City – and because she received a university fellowship from Florida State University.

Mallory’s conversion to Seminole was solidified after she married husband and law partner Peter “Pete” Mallory in 1996.

“I used to pull for the Gators,” said the 1987 Florida State Law graduate. “Before I married Pete I had orange tennis shoes. At our first FSU-Florida game, I wore my orange tennis shoes and Seminole shirt, but I’ve since given that up. I’m a Seminole diehard now after going to all the home games.”

Mallory met her husband when she was a senior attorney for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services – now the Department of Children & Families. She was prosecuting a case in which Pete represented the parents. As they worked on more cases together, they became good friends.

“That was the most difficult job that I’ve ever had,” recalled Mallory about handling child abuse and neglect cases. “In my mind, there is not a more important matter than dealing with the life of a child. You are taking children away from parents or you are inserting services in the home. It was a very demanding job.”

With the exception of the state job and working briefly at a law office in Jacksonville,

Mallory has always practiced at Panama City firms. The Mallory & Mallory partner considers herself fortunate to have worked with some of the city’s most well-respected lawyers since accepting her first legal job at Urquhart & Pittman in 1987.

Early in her career, Mallory worked primarily on personal injury and medical malpractice cases. Through the years, her areas of specialization have grown to include general civil litigation, real estate law and banking. Mallory’s current caseload is focused on transactional work, including a tremendous amount of pleading work. Although she no longer takes personal injury cases, her experience in the area helped her develop strong litigation skills. Mallory credits working for Marvin “Whitey” Urquhart in Panama City and Kitty Phillips and W.C. Gentry in Jacksonville with developing her pleading litigation skills.

“And you can’t have any other job where you get more litigation experience in the courtroom than working for the state,” remarked Mallory. “When I was at HRS, I would go to court practically every day.”

The real estate side of her practice has been impacted by the recent economic downturn, especially because lending has contracted. Mallory stays very busy with foreclosure work and handling commercial transactions for a bank holding company she has represented for more than 14 years.

After successfully practicing law for twenty-two years, Mallory is able to look back and laugh at the stress she experienced as a 1L in Dean Don Weidner’s Real Property class.

“He used to have seating charts with your pictures and walk down the desks and quiz people,” said Mallory. “I started developing high blood pressure. I went to the infirmary and they pinned it down to probably being stressed over his class – I was young and slightly intimidated.”

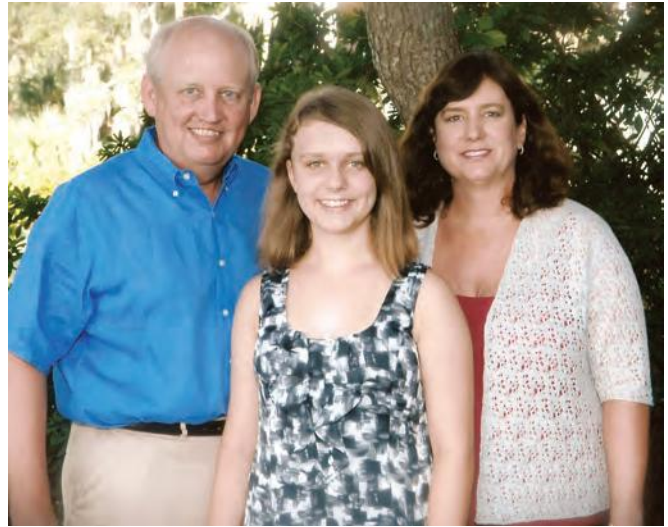
Even though his class caused her stress, Mallory still keeps in contact with Weidner. It was a visit by the dean that prompted Mallory to establish a law school scholarship for academically talented students in memory of her brother, Chad Denton.

“I had received \$5,000 a year as a fellowship for three years, so I felt like it was time for me to pay back and provide an opportunity for someone else,” said Mallory.

Family Focus

Even though Mallory and her husband are partners in the same office, they don’t work together often because they specialize in different areas of law. However, they do spend most of their time away from the office together, along with their 11-year-old daughter, Mimi. Mallory has a thriving law practice, but her number one priority is family.

“There is always going to be work to do – I’m fortunate in that regard – so I have to prioritize and at the end of the

day walk away from the rest of it and leave it at the office,” said Mallory, who spends most evenings eating dinner with her family at their home on Saint Andrew Bay. “Pete and I try to spend all of our spare time doing activities with our daughter.”

When she is not accompanying her daughter to dance, tennis or horseback riding lessons, Mallory spends her personal time traveling with Pete and Mimi and learning to maneuver a recently purchased family boat. She especially enjoys taking the boat to Shell Island on the weekends.

For now, Mallory’s primary focus is raising her daughter. She rarely contemplates plans for the future, but would eventually like to retire so she can spend more time with her family and travel.

“I don’t live to work; I won’t be one of those lawyers working into their 90s,” Mallory said. “But for now, to quote Larry Bird, it’s work hard, play hard!” ■

Blazing a New Path in Colombia

Growing up in Greenwood, Mississippi, Bill Montjoy never would have imagined he might move to Colombia at the age of 56 to manage a multinational corporation specializing in prepaid tuition. Although it may seem like an unlikely position for the 1975 Florida State Law graduate, it is a great fit when you consider his background.

Montjoy's great uncle was dean of the University of Mississippi School of Law and the first person to codify the statutory laws of the state of Mississippi. His father, uncle and older brother also are attorneys, so going to law school after earning a bachelor's degree in finance

was a natural choice for Montjoy. What led Montjoy to Florida State University was a friendship with fraternity brother Josh Morse, whose father was the law dean at Florida State University. When Montjoy visited Tallahassee as a prospective student, he liked the town and the atmosphere of the law school.

Although Montjoy practiced law with the Florida House of Representatives and at firms in Florida and Mississippi for several years after earning his law degree, he quickly realized he would rather use his education in a management role.

"Private practice was not my calling; I found that managing an organization

was more in tune with my skills," said Montjoy, whose first taste of running an organization came when one of his legal clients, the Florida Association of Rehabilitation Facilities, recruited him to serve as its executive director in 1985.

When he went to work for the upstart Florida Prepaid College Board and Florida Prepaid College Foundation in 1988, Montjoy began a string of education-related jobs that continues today.

"There were two aspects to this new challenge that were very intriguing," said Montjoy of becoming executive director of Florida Prepaid. "First of all it was an administrative and organizational chal-

lenge to start something – we didn’t even have so much as a paperclip – and build it up. And being involved in the investment side was very intriguing because that was my interest when I was in undergraduate school.”

Under Montjoy’s leadership, Florida Prepaid accomplished everything it set out to achieve. During his tenure, Montjoy was instrumental in lobbying for passage of tax-exempt status for qualified state tuition and savings plans. When he stepped down in 1996 to take a job lobbying for a student loan company in Jacksonville, the state’s prepaid tuition plan was the nation’s largest with more than 500,000 contracts and \$2 billion in managed funds.

Not long after leaving Florida Prepaid, Montjoy was recruited by a group of former diplomats to help start Global Education Group, a company that offers private, prepaid tuition plans to foreign nationals. In 1998, he was hired as chief operating officer and general counsel and he has served as president and chief executive officer since 2002. He spends his days managing employees, of which the company has approximately 300, setting the strategic course for the company and handling large transactions with other companies that have a significant impact on the organization. The company, which has almost reached the \$500 million mark, also is involved in insurance and annuities.

With corporate offices in Bogota, Miami and Holetown, Barbados, Montjoy does his fair share of traveling. He spends about 75 percent of his time in Bogota, which is home to the company’s operational headquarters. The rest of his time is spent managing off-shore activities

in the Miami office and meeting with clients and consultants around the world. He also visits the Barbados office about three times a year.

“It’s a cliché, but I always say you have to be present to win,” said Montjoy about his personal philosophy on management. “You can’t just say, ‘We have an office in Medellín,’ and never go there. Even if you have a vice president that goes there

once a month, you as president have the obligation to go to where you are doing business, so I travel extensively as a result.”

When Montjoy made Colombia his primary place of residence in 2006, the transition was difficult because he did not speak Spanish, nor did he fully understand the culture.

“We have a certain way in America of managing processes and projects and subordinates and in Latin America, it is a different culture. It is a different process and it’s a different rhythm to doing business. Understanding that and not reacting as you might if you were managing a company in the United States is a challenge.”

Now that he has learned the fundamentals of the language and has become more accustomed to the Colombian

culture, he loves living there. One factor in his love of the country is its “generous and hospitable” people – one of whom is his wife Adrianna.

The couple celebrated their nuptials in Amelia Island this past June along with friends and family, including their children. Montjoy has two adult daughters – Ashley, 29, and Rebecca, 26 – as does Adrianna – Juliana, 28, and Alejandra, 19.

In addition to embracing the way of life and people, Montjoy enjoys working in Colombia.

“The best part of my job is the fact that, even though we have a variety of products, our core business is still prepaid tuition,” said Montjoy, who has been in the business of helping send people to college for more than 20 years. “When you talk to a client that has the plan for their kids and you see how much it means to the family to have secured a college education financially for their children, I think that is the best part of what we do. And that is what drives you day in and day out – helping people.” ■

Tara Leigh Grove: Short Career, Long List of Achievements

Not many people can say they fine-tuned their career choice before they turned 20. Not many lawyers can say they have achieved their primary career goals within seven years of earning a J.D., either. But Florida State University College of Law Assistant Professor Tara Leigh Grove has done just that.

“When I was 19, I decided I wanted to be not only a law professor but a constitutional law professor. I’ve always wanted to teach, so I feel very fortunate to finally have this opportunity,” Grove said. “Now my goal is to do as good of a job as possible.”

This fall, Grove is teaching Federal Jurisdiction, and during the spring semester she will teach Constitutional Law and Statutory Interpretation. She will also have the opportunity to teach Bankruptcy and Civil Procedure in the future.

The path to Grove’s goal began as an undergraduate at Duke University, in her first constitutional law class. After graduating summa cum laude in 1998, she taught English at a Japanese junior high school for a year. Grove then enrolled at Harvard Law School, where she graduated magna cum laude in 2002. Following a federal appellate court clerkship, Grove worked for four years as an attorney in the Appellate Staff of the Civil Division of the United States Department of Justice.

Having argued cases in federal courts

in Philadelphia, Richmond, New Orleans, Cincinnati, Chicago, Denver, Atlanta and the District of Columbia, Grove brings a wealth of experience to her classes. “There is no better place to work than the Department of Justice if you have academic aspirations,” Grove said, because one spends most of his or her time writing briefs and memos. “My knowledge of the law expanded significantly.”

In teaching Federal Jurisdiction, Grove encourages students to think not only about legal rules but also about broader issues — ranging from difficult constitutional questions to the ways in which the law impacts real people. She asks the students to prepare two hypothetical problems each week. Typically, the problems are based on cases that were recently litigated in the federal courts. Grove explained that this approach is designed to show students that federal jurisdiction is “not just about procedural rules” but can have a significant impact on the lives of individuals.

Teaching a course like Federal Jurisdiction requires a professor to “rev up the energy level” because it is not a class that students tend to find interesting. Grove said: “It is not hard for me to get excited about the subject matter, but it can be hard for others — at least at first. My goal — even if I can’t get students to love this stuff — is to at least get them to like it more than they thought they would.”

She is pleased that, so far, her methods seem to be working. Her students approach the class from a variety of angles; some are interested in military JAG service, some judicial clerking and

some local government law. Others are interested in becoming U.S. attorneys, judges or environmental lawyers. Regardless of their aspirations, Grove said her students ask insightful questions that “show they are engaged with — and thinking hard about — the material; that is the greatest reward.”

Dean Don Weidner agrees that her teaching style works. After sitting in on one of her classes this fall, he called her a “dynamo” and said she had a natural talent for teaching. “She makes the subject matter interesting in a way that suggests she has theatrical training,” he said. “A musical lilt to her voice keeps students interested.”

To hone her teaching skills, Grove completed a two-year fellowship at Harvard during which she taught first-year legal writing before joining the Florida State Law faculty. “The fellowship helped me transition from law practice to academia,” she said. She described writing briefs for appellate judges as trying to get the judge from point A to point B as quickly as possible without thinking of the other options. The attorney, of course, must think of other angles but hopes to convince a judge that the case is really quite simple. An academic, she explained, not only wants to think about the elephant in the corner but also write about all the idio-

syncrasies surrounding the elephant.

Grove spends the bulk of her time away from the classroom reading and writing about constitutional law. Her scholarship focuses generally on separation of powers and federalism issues, and she writes extensively about judicial hierarchy: the Supreme Court’s relationship with the lower federal and state courts. She argues that the Court should decide cases broadly to provide guidance to lower courts, which contradicts the way Chief Justice John Roberts encourages the Supreme Court to function. She has a strong interest in bankruptcy courts because they add a fourth dimension to the federal judicial system.

When she is not working, Grove enjoys singing soprano in the choir at Tallahassee’s Grace Lutheran Church and visiting Walt Disney World with her husband, David Davies. Living in Florida is conducive to Grove’s other pastimes: running, walking and hiking. She also loves the warmth of the South, along with the abundance of Chick-fil-A restaurants. ■

Rodriguez Installed as First Minority President of OCBA

Diego “Woody” Rodriguez has been involved in many important “firsts” during his life. He was the first American-born, English speaker in his family after his parents emigrated to Miami from Cuba — by way of Spain — and he now is the first minority president of the Orange County Bar Association, one of the largest open bar organizations in the state.

Rodriguez, a 1995 graduate of Florida State University College of Law and a partner at Marchena & Graham, P.A., was installed in June at an emotional ceremony. While about five women have served as president of the organization, there previously had been no Hispanics or African-Americans.

“It was reaching an achievement I had never thought of or aspired to when I joined the Bar but it does make an impact on our younger lawyers, on law students,” Rodriguez said. “It was very similar, I think, to the way Justice (Raoul) Cantero had a very positive influence on my career when I saw he became a Supreme Court justice.”

The Orange County Bar Association is a very diverse organization, Rodriguez said. “The lack of a Hispanic leader, I would not say, is attributable to any policies or anything within the Bar. It is just one of those things that as the

times change, there are new opportunities for the face of the Bar leadership to change as well.”

Rodriguez grew up speaking Spanish at home. In fact, his father, now deceased, never learned English. His mother, who moved to Orlando to be near her grandchildren, attended his installation dinner and helps ensure that the second generation of American-born Rodriguez children grows up bilingual.

Rodriguez, a past president of the Hispanic Bar Association of Central Florida and the Young Lawyers Section of the Orange County Bar, also is an elected member of the board of Florida Citrus Sports, which coordinates the Capital One and the Champs Sports bowls. He also serves as legal counsel to the Hispanic Heritage Scholarship Fund of Metro Orlando, which provides up to \$100,000 to Hispanic students, including a \$5,000 law scholarship.

“It keeps me grounded to know that there are those in need and that I’ve got an obligation to serve and give back,” he said of his service to community organizations.

Rodriguez is actually only half of a powerful legal couple. He married

college sweetheart and fellow double Florida State alumnus Heather Pinder Rodriguez (’98) shortly after he completed law school.

“No matter what we do with the Bar, our first priority is always with our kids,” Rodriguez said about his children, Ella Grace, 7, and Gabriel Keyes, 3.

Some of the best advice he received in law school came from Professor David Powell. “He took some of the pressure off by reminding us that no matter what, if you worked hard, you were going to graduate and you were going to find a job,” said the board certified attorney in city, county and local government.

Not only has Rodriguez found a job, he’s become a leader whom young rising lawyers, especially Hispanics, can look up to.

2009-10 Alumni Board Focuses on Placement and Giving



The Florida State University College of Law Alumni Association Board of Directors is hard at work to accomplish two primary goals this year. Placement of recent graduates and current students is a considerable hurdle, considering the economic climate. The law school hopes to maintain or improve its 98 percent placement rate. A secondary priority, spearheaded by board president Ben Crump ('95), is to increase alumni participation in the annual fund drive after the participation rate dropped from 27 percent to 25 percent last year. Crump is joined in that effort to gain donors, large and small, by executive board members Linda G. Bond ('95), president-elect; Raymer F. Maguire, III ('79), past-president; and Jami M.

Balkom ('03), secretary/treasurer.

Crump believes in giving back to the communities that have helped establish him professionally and personally. The two-time graduate of Florida State University also is president of the Florida State University National Black Alumni Association. And, as president of that organization, he is an ex officio member of the Florida State Alumni Association.

As a member of all three organizations, Crump said it is beneficial to "be able to take successes that are work-

“These individuals not only became successful attorneys, but they are community advocates and leaders for future generations to look up to,” Daniels added.

The first of those is Zebedee Wright, who graduated in the class of 1971. Not only was Wright the first black law student at Florida State Law, but he also was secretary of the Student Bar Association. After being in private practice for 11 years, he was appointed county court judge in 1982. The book details the paths taken by Wright and other African-American trailblazers in Florida.

Florida's First was coordinated by the Virgil Hawkins Florida Chapter National Bar Association. Janeia Daniels, Florida State Law assistant dean for student affairs, served as research chair and editor-in-chief of the publication.

“It was fascinating to research these pioneers,” Daniels ('03) said. “Learning their stories and realizing their struggles would make anyone appreciate the steps they took to pave the way for those of us who followed.”

Daniels found it noteworthy that

The book debuted at the Legacy Gala during The Florida Bar’s Annual Convention in July and was accompanied by a video presentation of several interviews with the oldest living black lawyer profiled. The project was spearheaded by Florida Supreme Court Chief Justice Peggy A. Quince, who wrote in the book’s forward: “We believe that young people will realize that if individuals who were only several years out of slavery, with only a few of the resources we now take for granted could aspire to become, and did become, lawyers in this state, they, too, can be and do whatever they can dream.”

which essentially made him president of all SBA presidents nationally. In that position, he helped spread the word about Florida State Law and about law student mental health issues.

Helping Gibson implement his law school priorities was a 16-member executive board, including then-Vice President Will Hall ('09). Like Gibson, Hall was involved in SBA throughout his entire law school career.

“I learned a ton working with Ben,” said Hall, an associate at the Tallahassee office of McConnaughay, Duffy, Coonrod, Pope & Weaver, P.A. “Everyone calls him Benergy because he has so much energy and he is always optimistic. He would come into meetings and was always so excited about everything we were doing. Just seeing that and seeing the passion he had for SBA made me realize that if being president was something I wanted to do, I needed to make sure I brought that same passion to the position.”

Hall went on to serve as SBA president for 2008-09. Building on what Gibson had accomplished, Hall expanded Mental Health Day into Mental Health Week so SBA could better help students cope with law school stress. And he involved the organization more in efforts to raise money for ALS on behalf of Professor Steve Gey, who was diagnosed with the disease in 2006. Last year, SBA helped organize a 5K that raised more than \$4,000 for ALS research.

Hall's primary goal was more abstract than raising money or putting on events.

“What I sought out to do was to do

things that created a sense of community and family in the law school,” Hall said. “I really feel like last year's 1L class and 2L class feel invested in the school and invested in each other as a family. That is my proudest achievement, although it really goes back to the past



couple of years.”

Both former SBA presidents credit their student-run executive boards with the achievements that led to national recognition.

With the graduation of Hall and Gibson, the chance for a three-peat rests in the hands of current SBA president Andrew Fay and his executive board. One thing on Fay's side is the experience he gained working under both Gibson and Hall.

“I'm going to try to continue a lot of the things we've built,” said the third-year law student. “Ben was one of the reasons I got involved. He was a great

leader and Will was, too. Seeing them as presidents really encouraged me to continue a high standard.”

As everyone at the law school roots for another award, Gibson believes SBA is in good hands.

“Andrew was a 1L representative when I was SBA president, so he has now been part of two SBA boards that have been really good,” remarked Gibson. “I think he has the exact same mindset that Florida State's SBA needs to be number one in the country.”

Like Hall and Gibson, Fay knows he cannot be content with what SBA did in the past. It is that way of thinking that earned SBA awards in 2008 and 2009 and that will hopefully propel Florida State to be recognized as the nation's best in 2010. ■

Dean's Annual Fund-Raising Report



DEAR ALUMNI AND FRIENDS:

This was a year of great success for the law school. The reputation of our outstanding students, faculty and alumni continues to blossom. The highlight of recent external recognition was when *U.S. News & World Report* rated our school 52nd in the nation and our environmental law program 11th (tied with Stanford and Tulane).

Private fund-raising has made an important difference at the law school, especially in these times of dramatically reduced state budgets. This year, our Annual Fund was still quite strong, although not as strong as last year. Our major gifts were down significantly.

ANNUAL FUND

In recent years, we have garnered significant Florida and national attention with our extremely high alumni contribution rate. In 07-08, our 27 percent alumni giving rate ranked us 11th among all the nation's law schools. This year our alumni giving rate fell to 25 percent, still a competitive number. I hope that this coming year we can recapture lost giving. Our students are showing us the way. This past year, 71 percent of our students contributed to our Annual Fund. They are blazing the trail for us all!

Gifts to the Annual Fund enrich our entire academic program. The Annual Fund supports everything from student scholarships to distinguished speakers to graduation receptions for our students and their families to lunch at the Florida Bar exam.

MAJOR GIFTS

This past year, we received Major Gifts totaling \$1,031,831.67 in cash and \$394,391.00 in additional pledges, for a grand total of \$1,426,222.67. The "Cash Gifts By Level" portion of this report includes only payments made during the fiscal year, even if they are but a portion of a larger gift. We want our reporting to you to be as conservative as possible. Under the heading of "Recent Larger Gifts," we outline the larger gift commitments that we received in the 2008-2009 fiscal year.

Endowed Gift Opportunities

Endowed Scholarships

Our single greatest need from private giving is endowed scholarships. Our tuition has steadily increased and will continue to do so as our law school continues down what seems to be the inevitable road to privatization. To continue to serve our mission of providing access to all, including those from families of modest means, we will need significantly more scholarships. Scholarships are awarded according to the intent of the donor and can be based on merit, need or other factors.

The minimum gift needed to endow a scholarship at Florida State Law is \$25,000.

Endowed Professorships

Our faculty members have distinguished themselves both nationally and internationally as leaders in their fields. Their scholarship is both visible and influential and is helping to enhance the value of a degree from Florida State. They use their professional expertise and contacts to help our students get jobs.

It is critical to retain these extraordinary faculty members at Florida State. Many of them have been pursued by other top schools, both public and private. Just as in the private sector, productivity bonuses make an important difference. Endowed professorships provide salary supplements based on merit. They are not sinecures. Faculty members are appointed

to endowed professorships for five-year terms, with renewal contingent on continued scholarly productivity. The appointee to the professorship bears the name of the donor or the donor's designee.

The minimum gift needed to endow a professorship at Florida State Law is \$200,000.

Endowments for Excellence

Endowments for Excellence leave it to the discretion of the school how to spend income earned on endowment.

The minimum gift needed to create an Endowment for Excellence is \$25,000.

State Match and Recognition

Gifts to endowment are almost invariably made over time, usually over a five-year period. The state of Florida matches gifts to endowment at incremental ratios, starting with 50 percent for gifts of at least \$100,000 and increasing to 100 percent for gifts of \$2,000,001 and larger. Inter vivos gifts at \$200,000 or more are currently being acknowledged with an oil portrait displayed in a prominent place at the law school.

Recent Larger Gifts

We would like to specially thank those of you who made a larger gift commitment between July 1, 2008 and June 30, 2009. These gifts make it possible to continue the dynamic advance of the academic programs and reputation of the law school.

\$100,000 to \$299,999

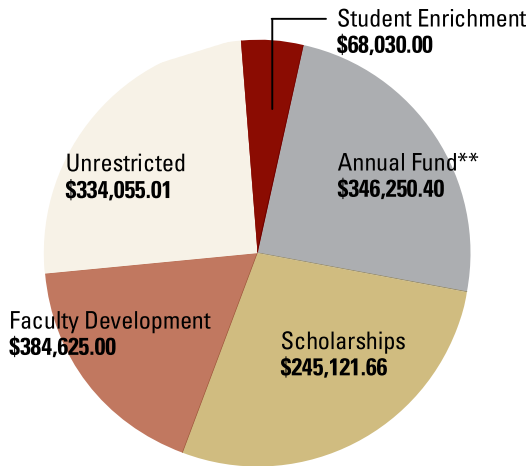

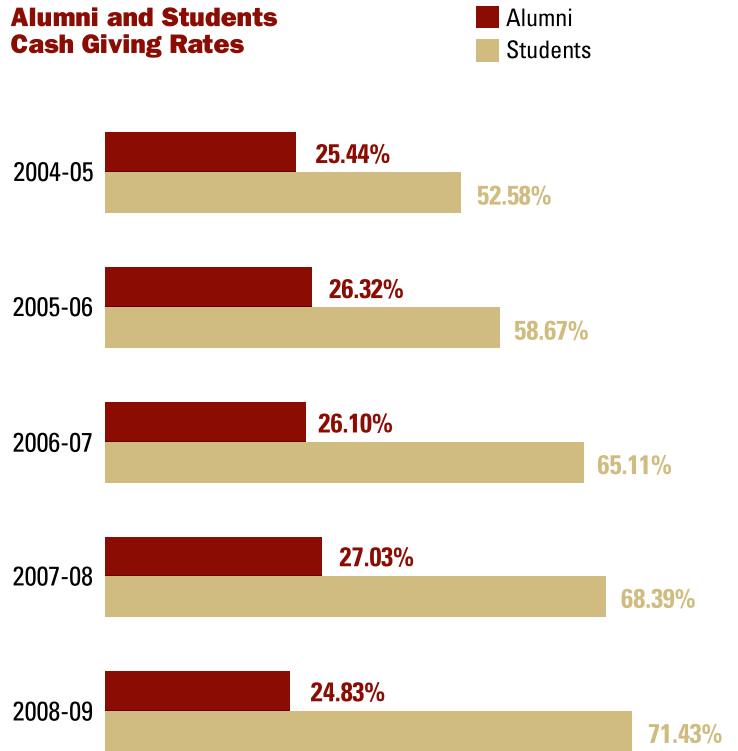
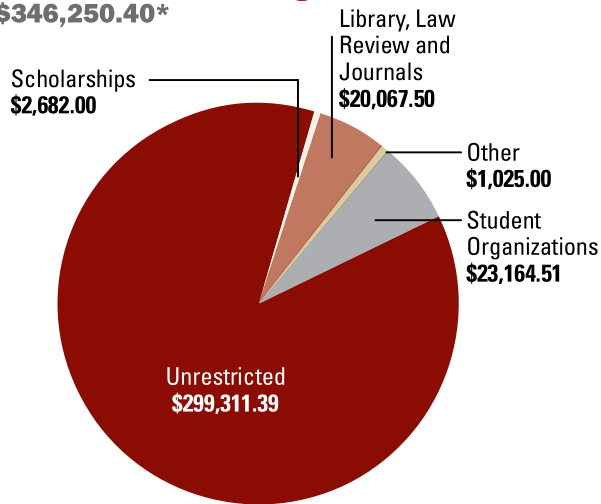
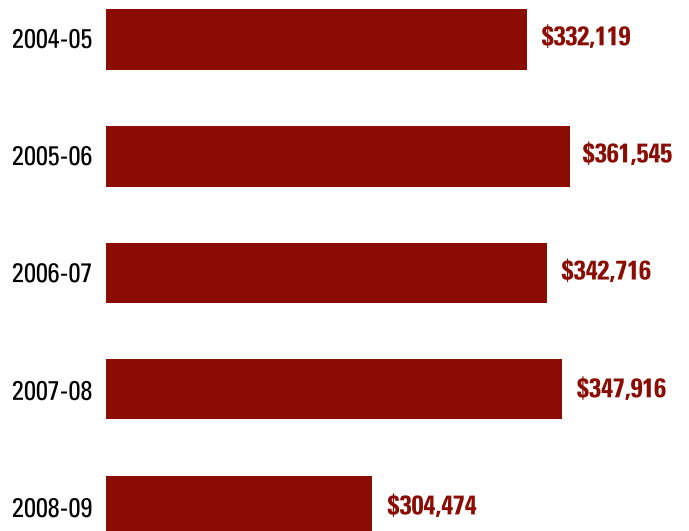

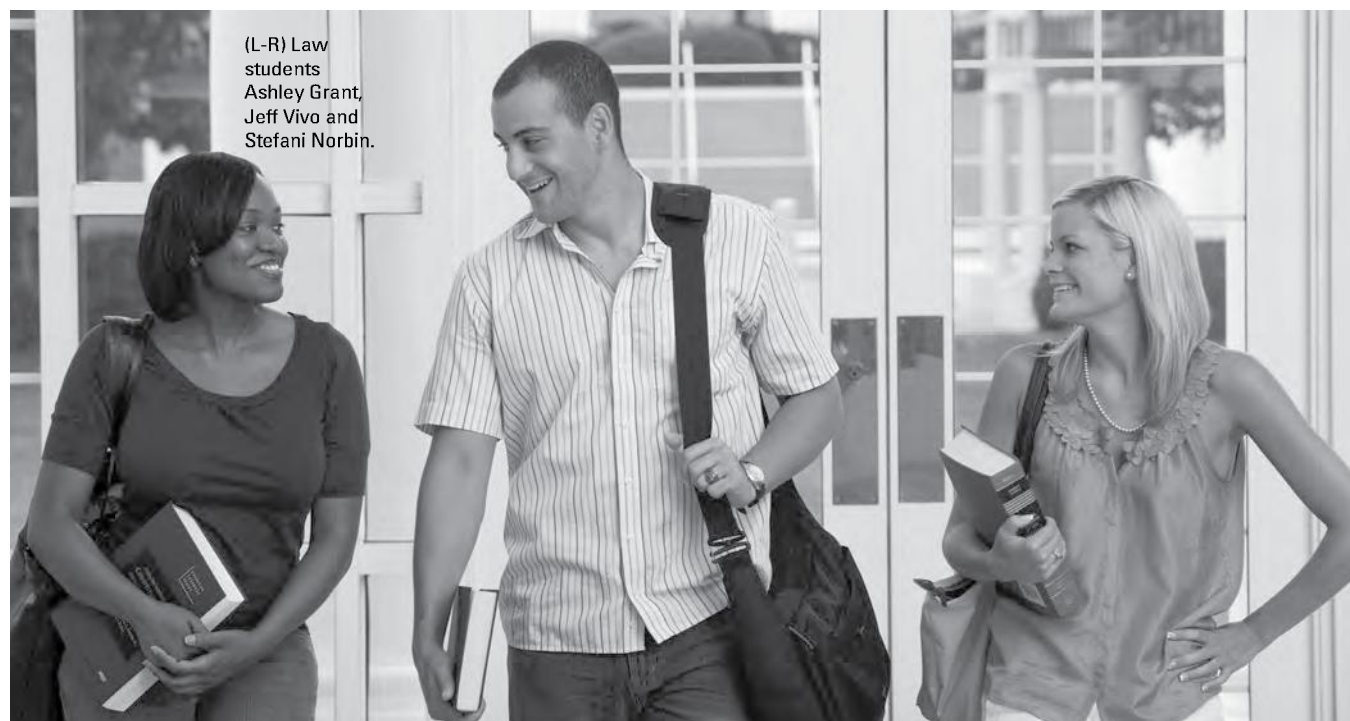

Four Faculty Members Publish Books

The Florida State University College of Law faculty is widely known for its scholarly productivity. In addition to publishing articles in top journals, professors also publish textbooks used by law schools around the nation and books based on cutting-edge research. In 2009, professors Frederick M. Abbott, Dino Falaschetti, Wayne A. Logan and Dan Markel each published new books.

Abbott, the Edward Ball Eminent Scholar, coauthored *Global Pharmaceutical Policy: Ensuring Medicines for Tomorrow's World* (Edward Elgar Publishing 2009) with the University of Oslo's Graham Dukes. The book examines the global system for the development, production, distribution and use of medicines. It also considers the pressure being placed on health-care budgets by the global economic crisis and policies to ensure access to medicines.

Abbott is highly regarded for his scholarship and professional activities in international intellectual property and global economic issues.

Associate Professor of Law and Economics Falaschetti has published a new book about the economic implications of democratic governance. *Democratic Governance and Economic Performance: How Accountability Can Go Too Far in Politics, Law, and Business* (Springer 2009) provides statistical evidence and case study illustrations to show how demands for increased accountability from our politicians and business managers are going too far — catering to power-

ful electoral, consumer and shareholder interests while weakening economic performance. The book suggests balancing concerns about political and business agents padding their own pockets with strategies that protect against populist principals doing the same.

Falaschetti is an empirical economist whose scholarship has concentrated on corporate governance, with special emphasis on executive compensation and the relationship between auditor independence and earnings quality.

Logan, the Gary & Sallyn Pajcic Professor and Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, published a new book on the registration of sex offenders. *Knowledge as Power: Criminal Registration and Community Notification Laws in America* (Stanford University Press 2009) traces the evolution of criminal registration laws. It provides an in-depth analysis of criminal registration and community notification laws, exploring the forces driving their rapid nationwide proliferation in the 1990s through today.

One of the nation's preeminent legal scholars on registration and community notification laws, Logan teaches and writes in the areas of criminal law, criminal procedure, sentencing and

torts.

D'Alemberte Professor Markel has published a new criminal justice book reflecting research that could impact criminal cases around the nation. *Privilege or Punish: Criminal Justice and the Challenge of Family Ties* (Oxford University Press 2009) (with Jennifer M. Collins and Ethan J. Lieb) offers a synthetic view of the intersection between crime, punishment and the family. It answers two basic questions: How does the American criminal justice system address a defendant's family status and how should a defendant's family status be recognized, if at all, in the criminal justice system? The book will be featured at an upcoming *Yale Law Journal* symposium.

Markel is a prolific scholar in the area of criminal law whose work has been published in leading law reviews.

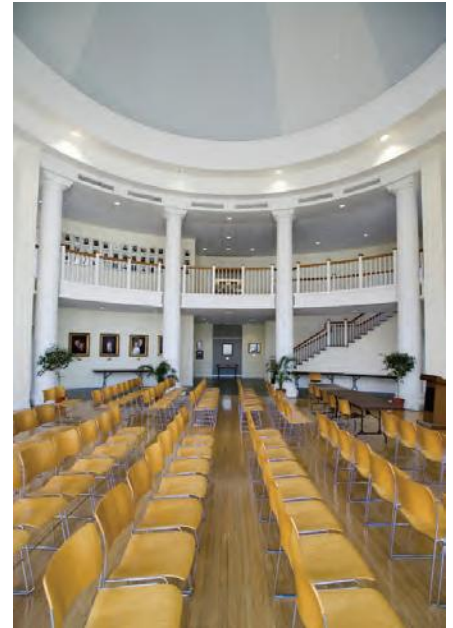

The National Jurist magazine has ranked Florida State University College of Law the 10th "best value" law school in the nation. The ranking, published in the magazine's September 2009 issue, considers tuition, employment rate and bar passage rate.

The national ranking reflects Florida State Law's strong student outcomes. Even in a down economy, 98 percent of the class of 2008 was placed within nine months of graduation. Florida State students also have had the best passage rate on the Florida Bar Exam for the majority of times the test was administered in recent years.

Florida State Law Ranked Third Best in Nation for Hispanics



Hispanic Business magazine named Florida State University College of Law the third best law school in the nation for Hispanics in its September 2009 issue. This is the sixth year in a row that Florida State Law has been named one of the top 10 law schools for Hispanic students.

The magazine based its ranking on a variety of factors, including the percentage of full-time Hispanic faculty, services for Hispanic students, Hispanic recruitment efforts and retention rates, the

percentage of Hispanic students enrolled, and the school's reputation as reflected in *U.S. News & World Report*. Florida State also has a significant network of highly successful Hispanic alumni.

"Although we have fewer Hispanic students than some other schools, a significant presence of Hispanics in the faculty and administration has helped us continue to climb in the *Hispanic Business* rankings," said Dean Don Weidner. "We are thrilled that our superb academic reputation and our dedication to the success of students from all backgrounds have earned us the number three spot."
