

Players in the Jobs Market

This summer, the *Wall Street Journal* reported that we are the nation's 25th best law school when it comes to placing our new graduates in jobs that require law degrees. Just this month, *Law School Transparency* ranked us the nation's 26th best law school in terms of overall placement score, and Florida's best. Our web

page includes more detailed information on our placement outcomes. In short, we rank very high nationally in terms of the number of students successfully placed. Although our average starting salary of \$58,650 is less than those at the nation's most elite private law schools, so is our average student indebtedness, which is \$73,113.

Alumni efforts have been critical to our success. A special thank you goes to every alum who has helped steer his or her firm or organization to recruit from Florida State. We at the school are very proud of our extraordinarily talented and personable students. But it takes you in the "real world" to interview them. Assistant Dean for Placement, Rosanna Catalano, her number two, Nicole Scialabba, or I will be glad to help you meet with students, either in person or by video-conference technology. Please let any of us know if you would like to meet with one or more of our students, whether you have a permanent opening or not. Please know that many of our students, especially the 1Ls, would be delighted to have an unpaid internship to gain the professional work experience.

If you would like to become listed as a Placement Mentor, please let me, dweidner@law.fsu.edu, or Rosanna Catalano, rcatalan@law.fsu.edu, know. Placement Mentors agree to catch the occasional call or email from a student interested in the same geographic or substantive area. You might like to join in the work of our Alumni Association Board of Directors, which has a Placement Committee. Among other things, the Placement Committee has started hosting networking events in individual cities to help orient our students who are committed to those communities. This past year, we had these receptions with, roughly, a dozen alums and twenty students, in both Orlando and Tampa. The receptions were very well received by both students and alumni. Admissions and Rankings

The national press has highlighted the related phenomena of the tight legal job market and rising student indebtedness. More prospective applicants are asking if a law degree is worth the cost, and law school applications are down significantly. Ours have fallen by approximately 30% over the past two years. Moreover, our "yield" rate has gone down, meaning that fewer students are accepting our offers of admission. Our research makes clear: prime competitor schools can offer far more generous scholarship packages. To attract the top students, we must limit our enrollment and increase scholarship awards. We are working with our university administration to limit our enrollment, which of course has financial implications both for the law school and for the central university. It is also imperative to increase our endowment in a way that will yield us more scholarships for prospective students. Increased scholarships are our top financial priority. Without these, we will lose the battle at the admissions desk. The resulting decline in the credentials of our entering class is likely to have an adverse impact on some of the most visible national rankings. More Outstanding Student Accomplishments

Through it all, we are charging ahead to sustain and advance an extraordinary program. Our students remain extremely successful, not just in the job market but also in national competitions. In August, the American Bar Association Law Student Division once again named our Student Bar Association the "SBA of the Year." Just last month, our Mock Trial Team won first place in the National Criminal Trial Advocacy Competition held in San Francisco, California. And the year in advocacy competitions is still young. Our Moot Court Team is gearing up for what we hope will be another great year. And, apart from our co-curricular activities, students throughout the school are succeeding in ways that bring credit to themselves and to all of us.

Ricky Polston: Our First Seminole Chief Justice

ell into his first year as commander of the Florida Supreme Court, Chief Justice Ricky Polston is enjoying the job and his new administrative duties. The December 1986 College of Law graduate credits colleagues with helping prepare him to lead the court.

"Being chief justice means more administrative responsibilities, so there are a lot of day-to-day things that you have to take care of. Prior to becoming chief justice I served as the administrative justice, so in a way that is a stepping stone preparation for becoming chief justice," said Polston. "The other thing that assisted the transition is Chief Justice Canady did an excellent job involving me in certain things so that I was aware of what was going on when I took office. Lisa Goodner, our state courts administrator, does excellent chief justice school. She puts whoever is going into that office through very thorough classes on the responsibilities that the court and the branch have generally and the role the chief plays in connection to that. When Chief Justice Canady went through that process a couple of years ago, he included myself and Justice Labarga in his classes, so this year I went through it again and I also included Justice Labarga in those same classes as well."

Among the most pressing of Chief Justice Polston's many administrative responsibilities is the judicial branch's

When talking with Chief Justice Polston, you get the sense that he knows life is not going to slow down anytime soon, so he is embracing it. The Florida State University College of Law could not have hoped for a better representative as its first chief justice.

are that in this current fiscal year we should have a surplus, on the horizon we have Eurozone problems and the fiscal cliff," said Chief Justice Polston about the world's current economic situation. "Those are very looming storms out there that we all hope go away. As long as those issues don't negatively impact us, we hope our budget will be okay. But that is a concern. Our core focus is getting adequate funding for the branch.

"As a percentage of the total funding for state government, for eight years we went out and said that the judicial branch represented 0.7% of the total state budget. This current fiscal year it is 0.6% of the total state budget."

The court system's technological needs also are important to the chief justice.

"Technology issues in the branch are huge," said Chief Justice Polston. "That involves the current development of a statewide portal for electronic filing. We also have rules for e-service by attorneys. We are moving to a paperless court system in Florida which affects all our appellate and trial courts."

"If you could sum up in a phrase the state of the judicial branch, that phrase would be concerned about the through a computer conversion knows that it is challenging."

Chief Justice Polston's love for appellate law means that he still enjoys the other primary part of his job – deciding cases. The characteristics that have made him a good judge benefit him as a chief justice.


"He is thoughtful, smart, prepared and persuasive," said First District Court of Appeal Judge L. Clayton Roberts ('91), who served for two years with Chief Justice Polston before his appointment to the Florida Supreme Court. "He examines the issues. He is always willing to talk, he doesn't become entrenched in his position, but he has a position. He is willing to listen and give you his thoughts and he wants to hear your thoughts. He is very respectful, but when he decides, he decides."

Although his to-do list grew substantially when he became head of the state's highest court, Chief Justice Polston still is very engaged with the law school. Teaching is one way he stays connected.

"I love doing it," said the chief justice.
"I've had to juggle the times of classes.
For example, during the summer I taught at night. It was the first time I've

Amy Voigt Xenofos: Taking Off at NASA

my Voigt Xenofos was minutes away from taking one of her last law school exams when she received a call that would shape the rest of her professional career. The caller was one of Xenofos' current bosses at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

"When she called, she said, 'Hi, is this a good time?' and I said, 'Oh yea, I'm just walking into a final, I've got a few minutes," said Xenofos, who was offered a job at NASA the week after she graduated in 2000. "She said that made her think I would be a fit here because if I was completely nonchalant and the pressure of an impending final wasn't getting to me, that was a good indicator that I would be able to handle the job."

Today, Xenofos serves as Assistant Chief Counsel, General Law and External Partnerships at NASA's Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. Ninety percent of her time is spent on "generic government lawyer" work – negotiating government contracts, government ethics, litigation and fiscal law – but she also has had some unique experiences that only NASA could have provided.

Xenofos was intimately involved with the 2003 Columbia accident. When the shuttle broke apart upon re-entry, debris was strewn across Texas and Louisiana, so NASA's Houston office was ground zero for the initial response.

"The day after the accident my boss said, 'You are going to support the recovery team out in the field that is collecting debris," said Xenofos, who packed a suitcase, boxed up some office supplies and drove to western Louisiana to meet the team that was gathering physical evidence. "The first thing that I was responsible for doing was making sure we collected the evidence we needed from the crash site to determine a cause of death and issue death certificates. The families needed those to take care of their affairs and that was really tough. I ended up spending five weeks with the Mishap Investigation Team in the field and I learned a lot."

Xenofos' first assignment at NASA was serving as lead attorney for a land transfer of 66 acres. The sale of NASA's Industrial Plant to the City of Downey (California), where the plant was located, was groundbreaking.

"There was a significant amount of contaminated soil and groundwater in the area from decades of government operations," said Xenofos. "Normally if the government is going to transfer land, we have to clean it up first. But we knew the cleanup was going to take a long time and the city wanted to go ahead and utilize the property and be able to make it usable again. So we worked out a deal where we would sell them the property, with the idea that it wasn't cleaned up yet, but that they were going to take over the cleanup and we would give them a discount on the purchase price for the cost that it was going to take to finish the cleanup. That had never been done in the government before we did it.

"It was great because, who at 25 gets

to be the lead counsel on an enormous land transfer and environmental responsibility transfer that has never been done in the government. It was awesome!"

With the end of the shuttle program and recent changes to NASA's mission, Xenofos currently plays an integral role in how NASA is supporting and advancing commercial human space exploration efforts.

"I'm our lead counsel for external partnerships," said Xenofos. "We've developed this entire practice of nontraditional agreements using NASA's 'other transaction' authority, which we call Space Act Agreements and I'm one of the agency experts on them. We use these in all sorts of areas, but the most popular thing that's been done with them lately is to use Space Act Agreements to provide funding to help commercial companies develop the capability to carry cargo and people into low Earth orbit. These instruments were the core mechanisms for NASA's Commercial Orbital Transportation Services (COTS) project and the Commercial Crew Program (CCP), both of which I was lucky enough to serve as co-lead counsel on. Prior to the last year, the only people that could put cargo and people into orbit were governments. NASA is helping invest in the private sector to be able to develop a new capability for industry to provide back to NASA."

In addition to shaping her professional life, NASA has had a significant impact on Xenofos' personal life. In 2006, the Coral Gables native temporarily left Houston for a detail at NASA's Headquarters in Washington, D.C. Also on temporary assignment in

the nation's capital was Xenofos' future husband, George, a mechanical engineer for NASA.

"We both were working in the Exploration Systems Mission Directorate – he was the deputy chief engineer and I was the lead counsel and we were probably the only people in the organization that were in their early 30s," recalled Xenofos. "It didn't take us long to find each other and to become friends and he eventually asked me out."

Xenofos and her husband, who she refers to as a rocket scientist because he holds a patent on a rocket engine injector, started dating, got married, bought a house and had a daughter within about 24 months. Their daughter, Sophie, will turn three years old in January.

If the stars align, Sophie will end up like her mother – in a job about which she is passionate.

"Part of the reason I love my job is because I feel like I'm getting to contribute to something bigger," said the self-proclaimed space geek. "Despite all of the drama that NASA has had and despite all of the federal budget cuts, you see how dedicated everybody is here. You see how interested people are in learning new things and exploring and all the different technologies and capabilities that get developed. People here are so excited about what they do—you really feel like you are helping people achieve their dreams. Most lawyers aren't lucky enough to have that."

Joseph W. Lawrence, II: Working for Justice

s one of nine siblings, Fort Lauderdale attorney Joseph Lawrence learned to love noise and competition. He also was surrounded by love and friendship.

"It was the best way to grow up," remarked Lawrence, who was the second youngest child. "You can't beat having eight best friends growing up."

His mother, Nancy, taught her children to treat all people fairly – a value that is ever present in Lawrence's mind. Perhaps that is why, like many entering law students, Lawrence decided to become an attorney – to "save the world" and "work for justice."

Lawrence, who had boyhood aspirations of becoming a Catholic priest, spends much of his time helping others through his church and other spiritual groups. One such organization is BOLD Justice—a social action program in Broward County that works with area churches to influence the government to provide needed services such as affordable housing and medical care. Lawrence also has traveled to Haiti and Jamaica to work with our less fortunate Caribbean neighbors.

"I work with St. Thomas University, their School of Theology and Ministry in Miami and there I can put my life's lessons into partnerships," said Lawrence. "I have done so through Haiti, where I work along with a group of people on developing a coffee farming cooperative. What we are trying to do

is to work with the coffee farmers to help them obtain a living wage for their work. We coordinated with an Italian coffee roaster to agree to purchase in bulk their coffee bean product and then to sell it in Europe. Also, we take a certain quantity that we pre-purchase and sell it in the United States and that way we have increased the ability of the farmers – who now work together – to market their goods. And we provide them assistance through third-party experts in helping them grow their crop and keep their crop safe from insects without the use of pesticides.

"We also work with a group of artisans in a small town in northwest Haiti in helping them market in the U.S. – these are women who are the heads of their family, who have no ability to get employment in their area. Two nuns that live there have taught them how to make beautiful artisan goods. It is a huge way to work with people, using no lawyer skills, but using what the law school taught me as far as integrity and work ethic."

Upon graduation from the College of Law, Lawrence began his legal career doing consumer protection work at the Florida Attorney General's Office in Tallahassee. "Frankly, I was going to save the world, in consumer protection. Then, I went into the administrative law section of the Attorney General's Office, which handled the legal counseling for the professional regulatory boards, thinking I could do more justice in an environment where the public is protected by regulatory agencies and I could also protect the public from regulatory agencies."

After moving to the Florida De-

partment of Business and Professional Regulation to do similar work, Lawrence entered private practice.

"I still believe I'm doing justice," said the December 1975 graduate, "but now for private companies and individuals who need to make their way through the system."

Lawrence's firm, Vezina, Lawrence & Piscitelli, P.A., handles construction litigation cases.

"Although we do it all, our specialty is in horizontal construction – highways, bridges, site development, underground utilities, earthwork, rock mining, anything in a horizontal fashion. For the most part we represent contractors and engineering firms."

Lawrence's predecessor firm had one office in Tallahassee when it opened more than 25 years ago. The "wonderful, noisy filled environment" of South Florida suits Lawrence well, so it is fitting that he opened a second office in Fort Lauderdale a few years later.

"We were a statewide law firm of approximately six lawyers and were spending a lot of time in the South Florida area and traveling out of Tallahassee," said Lawrence. "We already had a burgeoning client load down here. It was where I was spending most of my time, but living in hotels."

In recent years, much of Lawrence's time is spent mentoring the younger attorneys in his firm – many of whom also are Florida State Law alumni.

"It's much easier to practice law than it is to help someone learn how to practice law," said Lawrence, who is the father of five, two of whom are attorneys. "I enjoy the competitiveness of life, the more difficult, the more I enjoy it. So working with younger attorneys who care is joyful. I don't know that I am good at it, but I know that is where I need to be."

Through Lawrence's mentoring, the next generation of attorneys is learning to treat people fairly and to work for justice, too.

J. Wiley Horton: Helping Inventors Take Flight

hen J. Wiley Horton decided to join Angel Flight Southeast, the Tallahassee patent law attorney thought he might perform one flight per quarter on his Cesna Turbo 206. Volunteering for the organization – which arranges free air transportation, via private aircraft, for people in medical and financial need who must travel long distances to access health care – is a way Horton can use his experience as an instrument-rated pilot to help others. Because the medical histories of those in need of Angel Flight services are so moving, and because there are not many volunteer pilots in the area, Horton has transported patients as often as every 2-3 weeks.

"A lot of these are relay flights, so you might have somebody from South Florida that needs to go to Houston and the Angel Flight folks will break that into three legs," explained Horton. "One of the beauties of the system is – many of the patients are from rural areas – people just don't realize how many airfields there are in the United States. The type of

aircraft that I fly, you only need about a thousand feet of grass to land. We sometimes land at private strips. People bend over backwards for us." Horton has even experienced air-traffic controllers at international airports holding commercial flights for his Angel Flight.

Horton, who practices at Pennington, Moore, Wilkinson, Bell & Dunbar, has flown all over the world. After getting married in June 2011, Horton and his new wife, Eva, flew around Botswana, Mozambique, South Africa and Zambia during their honeymoon. This August, the Hortons welcomed their first child, a daughter named Eliza.

"I don't really notice the work," said Horton about the long nights that are common with an infant. "It's a little different for me because I'm 46 and I didn't think I was going to have any children, so it's hard to see the bad side of it. She is a delight."

Prior to fatherhood and law school, Horton worked as an aerospace design engineer under contracts for the United States government. His technical background has been extremely beneficial in his practice.

"I started drafting patents primarily for individual inventors and small companies," said Horton, who has built the largest patent law practice in north Florida and south Georgia. "It's really just been a word-of-mouth thing. Most of my clients are not in the area – I have clients all over the U.S. and foreign clients. I think the reason the business has grown is, the common complaint of people that want to get patents drafted is they talk to patent attorneys and the attorney doesn't understand what they are talking about. When I get a compliment

for something in my business practice, it is almost always that I understood what they were talking about."

Because he loves learning, working with inventors is ideal for Horton. In order to fully understand his clients' products, Horton must research complex concepts. "A lot of my time is spent reading background information – things like textbooks. Wikipedia is, frankly, one of the best sources for technical information."

Evidence of his clients' inventions can often be found scattered around Horton's office – items such as a jet

Horton also represents Dr. Tommie Wright – who composed Florida State's fight song – and has drafted patents for a number of significant innovations for the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory.

The holder of several patents, Horton still loves to design. When someone comes to him with a good idea, but not the knowledge or ability to build their invention, Horton often helps design it and refers the client to a company that can bring it to life. He also matches inventors with investors when needed.

Like many passionate designers,

boat nozzle, cast-concrete platelets and a power circuit board. Horton has been fortunate to help many people turn their initial ideas into thriving businesses. One such example is Applied Fiber – a Havana, Florida-based company that manufactures terminated synthetic fiber tension systems.

"That is now a very successful company run by an individual named Richard Campbell, who is incredibly innovative in the field of high-strength fibers," said Horton about the company he has represented since Campbell came to him with the initial idea. "When I first met him he was 12 or 13 years old; I didn't have a professional involvement with him at that time. He had a business selling, at that point mail-order, parts for radio-controlled cars and trucks."

Horton's home includes a machine shop and welding shop.

"I do a lot of antique firearms restoration and I still build a good number of prototypes. Since getting married, I am mostly building furniture – I built a table for Christmas – and I've got a baby carrier I'm working on. It's going to be welded out of aluminum tubing. It's a backpack-based carrier and it should be good from about six months through 3 years."

Horton is not building the carrier with dreams of marketing it to the masses; he is just a dad who wants a better carrier than what is available commercially. Should the product gain popularity, though, Horton is in the perfect position to make it available to parents everywhere.

Tanya L. Bower: Building Businesses and Bettering Broward County

anya Bower builds jigsaw puzzles.

Not literally, but that is how she describes her job.

"My niche is, I represent the business owner from beginning to end and everything in between," said the Tripp Scott director about her Fort Lauderdale-based practice. Bower discovered her specialty area while she was a law student.

"When I went to FSU, I tried to take every business course I could take and tried to stay as far away from litigation as I could," said Bower. "I had the pleasure of taking an adjunct professor who taught Corporate Tax and the world became very clear and bright and sunny. At his advice, I went for a year at Miami for a Tax degree.

"While I wouldn't tell you I'm a tax attorney, the tax comes into about 85% of everything that I do," said Bower, who earned her LL.M. in Taxation a year after she earned her law degree. "For employers, sometimes we'll do deferred compensation plans to keep key employees around and a lot of that is tax based. As part of representing the business owner, the majority of their wealth sits in their business, so I do estate planning. I really enjoy estate planning for business owners because it has so many different nuances to it."

Bower often develops strong bonds with her clients.

"A lot of times, I am much more of a consultant or advisor than I am a

true attorney for my clients. I do feel like in many ways I am part of their family and their business," said Bower, whose immediate family includes two dogs – Cinnamon and Tessa. "I have a client who is in his 70s and he's got six living kids and I know all their names, I know almost all of their kids' names, I know where they are going to college, and his kids call me."

In addition to having a thriving law practice, Bower is very involved in community service. The Broward County native is proud of the area in which she grew up and cannot remember a time when she wasn't working to make her community better. When she first started practicing, Bower joined the Seminole Club of Broward County as a way to give back to the university. More recently, her service efforts have evolved around her membership in the Junior League of Broward County, Leadership Broward and the United Way of Broward County.

"If you look at some of the major non-profits in Broward County, they were started by the Junior League and it makes me very proud to be part of that organization," said Bower. Through the league, she became involved with the United Way and a project to create a resource center for youth transitioning out of foster care. "Leadership Broward is an organization my firm has supported for 15 or 20 years. It has a community-gives-back element and they have programs from middle school to retirement age - this year we have focused tremendously on improving our high school program and trying to get the public schools involved. A lot of it is trying to make our community

a better place."

Bower also enjoys her free time in Broward County.

"I love yoga; I try to do it at least three times a week," said Bower. "Being in lovely, sunny South Florida, I started learning how to paddle board with the goal to eventually do stand-up paddle board yoga. And I golf a little bit – I wouldn't tell you I'm a golfer, I hit balls.

"Even though I hardly ever go to the beach, I like the fact that I can drive

Bower showed horses competitively into her college years. Initially, she paid for lessons by feeding horses and cleaning stalls and eventually owned two horses – Bounce and Spirit.

"When I bought him he was crazy and he tried to kill me; he was a totally misunderstood horse," Bower said about Spirit. "He was not the most attractive horse when you just walked up on him but when you saddled him up, put him onto the bridle and entered the show

ring, you couldn't miss him. He was beautiful and he taught me a lot about perseverance and responsibility."

Bower also learned many of life's lessons from her grandmother, Nana. She was a single mother who owned a successful real-estate title office in which Bower worked.

"It was unusual to see someone in the 70s and 80s as a female not be employed by somebody," said Bower. "I learned a lot about dealing with people and dealing with clients. She had some clients who were extremely loyal and I learned a lot about treating clients well from that experience. I have clients who are extremely loyal to me and I am loyal to them and I am the first one they call even if it is not a legal issue sometimes. A lot of that I learned from her from a very early age."

Her mentor at Tripp Scott, Dennis Smith, has re-enforced Bower's commitment to customer service.

"My career in the last 13 years, in a lot of ways follows the path of Dennis Smith," said Bower. "If there is one thing I want to take from what I've watched happen with him is the continuing loyalty of clients. The clients I have today, I want them still to be my clients as I am facing retirement − whether it's them or it's their kids." ■

Professor Hannah Wiseman Brings Cutting-Edge Energy Law to Florida State

f you walk through the College of Law's campus and ask for Professor Wiseman, the reply you receive might be, "Which one?" Married professors Hannah Wiseman and Sam Wiseman both are Yale law school graduates and joined the Florida State University College of Law faculty in January 2012.

"We met on the library tour, and then we were in the same small group at Yale," said Hannah Wiseman. "We were worried that we'd end up talking about the law all of the time, but in fact we only talk about the law most of the time."

Hannah Wiseman, a gardener in her free time, hasn't started a citrus grove quite yet, although she is "working on it" with her small potted lemon tree. The ability to garden year-round is one of the reasons she loves living in Tallahassee. She also enjoys outdoor activities and the natural wildlife refuges and forests that are so close to the capital city.

The law school's national reputation is ultimately what brought Wiseman to Tallahassee and Florida State.

"I came here because of the strengths of the environmental program, which includes environment, energy, and land use," said Wiseman. "We have a lot of professors who are experts in many areas. It is a lively community of both professors and practitioners. I felt I could thrive by having other people working on the same issues nearby."

The strength of the law school's alumni base was another contributing factor to her decision to move to Tallahassee.

"I think the dedication of the alumni base sets the school apart from almost any other," said Wiseman. "That was one of the first things I learned about the school, and I've been amazed at how enthusiastic the alums are."

A rising star in the field of energy law, Wiseman focuses her research and

writing on bringing together three core areas: land use and property, environmental law and energy law. She has special expertise in hydraulic fracturing, also known as fracking.

"People often wonder how I got so interested in natural gas, because I'm in Florida. It's because I started my teaching career in Texas, at the University of Texas, and that was when natural gas was just taking off," said Wiseman. "Drilling and hydraulic fracturing for gas as well as wind energy development were all happening in one state, and it was very interesting to see both the land use and environmental issues that emerged because of these changes. I became obsessed with energy because of where I was geographically when I started my career, and because I realized that most environmental issues are directly connected to energy.

"Hydraulic fracturing is part of a larger oil and gas development process; it's used in about 90 percent of new natural gas laws in this country and in a lot of the oil wells now being gas production from areas that, until the past decade or so, were considered uneconomical. This means domestic oil and gas production has increased dramatically while enhancing national security and benefitting the economy. Environmental risks, however, also have increased.

"We need to figure out how to regulate it well," said Wiseman about hydraulic fracturing. "The primary issue is the concern surrounding potential environmental contamination. A lot of people have focused on the possibility of underground contamination, but I don't think that's the biggest risk. I think we need to worry more about surface effects. Individually, these might seem benign, but when you have thousands of wells combined, they pose some challenges."

Wiseman brings her research and first-hand experiences into the class-room, much to the advantage of her students.

"I give students specific examples from the land use cases I've been involved in," said Wiseman, who worked pro bono for the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association as of counsel for two years in Austin, Texas. "I ask them their opinion about how to best regulate hydraulic fracturing, which is one of the growing areas in energy. I often challenge them to think more broadly about the intersection of the areas that I research in and how they will approach some of the energy laws that haven't developed yet."

Wiseman travelled to Washington, D.C. in March to teach Congressional staff members about the environmental impacts of hydraulic fracturing. A project organized by professors from Duke University's biology department, the session was planned to describe the primary risks of the practice and the regulatory functions taken so far.

If she hadn't entered legal academia, Wiseman would most likely be working for a non-profit organization, she says.

"I initially went to law school hoping to make some difference in the environmental community, and I think a way to do that other than teaching is to practice law," said Wiseman. "I would likely practice on the non-profit side because I tend to focus a lot on controlling environmental impact. I think that's a very rewarding career."

Former Dean and Professor Emeritus Joshua Morse Passes Away

n Thursday, September 13, Joshua Morse, III, passed away at his home in Tallahassee. The former law school dean was 89 years old. He served as the College of Law's dean from 1969 to 1980 and as a professor from 1969 to 2003.

A native of Poplarville, Mississippi, Morse received his bachelor's degree from the University of Mississippi and his J.D. from Ole Miss. He practiced law for fourteen years before joining the faculty at the University of Mississippi School of Law in 1962. He was appointed dean of the law school at the University of Mississippi in 1964 and he became the second dean at the Florida State University College of Law five years later.

Colleagues, friends and students especially appreciated Morse's keen intelligence, his sense of humor and his sophistication.

"Josh was such a unique and wonderful man," said Eugene E. "Gene" Stearns ('72). "I have so many fond memories of the puzzled expression as he thought carefully about a response to something I said, his wry smile and sideways looks when he tried to make me better than I was, with such subtle prodding it was hardly noticeable."

"He was a true renaissance man with his knowledge and interests," said Emeritus Professor Chuck Ehrhardt. "He was a student of economics and history and he was a font of information about

During his eleven years as dean, Morse built upon the initial faculty and obtained funding first for Roberts Hall and then for the library addition.

"We shared Longmire with the Alumni Office and the Religion Department," Ehrhardt said about the law school's previous facilities. "The library was in half the basement of Longmire, so the new buildings were crucial to the development of the law school. And because of his contacts primarily at Yale, where he had gone back to get a graduate degree and was good friends with the faculty, we were able to recruit new faculty of a very high quality. He was an excellent choice to lead the law school."

Also under Morse's leadership, the Florida State University College of Law established the first summer program at Oxford University offered by an American law school.

"I loved Josh Morse and will always remember him with tremendous respect, admiration and fondness, and an equal measure of laughter! I graduated in 1976, and although I have not been in contact with Dean Morse in years, I have often reminisced about him as dean, an effective teacher, reliable friend and fun-loving, overseas bud," said Gail Sosby ('76), who was with Morse in England for the 1974 summer program. "I remember taking his Admiralty class, and playing foosball with him and discussing the subjects

of the day, during our daily coffee and tea times in Oxford."

Morse taught in the Oxford program as well as other international programs and remained a member of the teaching faculty at Florida State until his retirement in 2003. He also published numerous articles on international law, maritime law, and oil and gas law.

"Before he got into legal academia, he was a very successful trial lawyer in Mississippi and was president of the Mississippi Trial Lawyers Association," said Ehrhardt. "He represented 33 clients charged with murder, with a result of 32 not guilty verdicts."

Morse's professional contributions outside of the law school were numerous. For fifty years, Morse was active in law reform, serving as a commissioner of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws (also known as the Uniform Law Commission). In 1973, he received a direct commission in the Judge Advocate Generals Corp of the United States Navy and retired as a captain in 1986. In the 1980s, he was of counsel to the Fowler White law firm during the representation of clients involved

in the collision and destruction of the Sunshine Skyway Bridge in Tampa Bay.

Morse is survived by his wife of 66 years, Nell Hartzog Morse, three children and six grandchildren. His son Joshua Stanford Morse graduated from the Florida State University College of Law in 1977. Memorial gifts can be made to the Josh Morse Scholarship at the Florida State University College of Law.

Alumni Give Back in Guatemala

In April, several College of Law alumni traveled to Guatemala for a philanthropic reunion. While there, they built a home for a local woman named Eusebia and her six children. The trip was the brainchild of Kenneth Bell ('82) and Lawton Langford ('82), who wanted to celebrate their 30th law school reunion year in a purposeful way. The group, which included Bell, Langford, James Ervin ('82) and Thomas Klein ('82), chose Panajachel as their destination because of a classmate's work in the hillside city. Class of '82 member Lloyd Monroe's ministry, Porch de Solomon, hosts faith-based and secular short-term mission teams that build homes for indigenous families and provide free medical and dental clinics.

"Lloyd had the courage to give up a successful law practice and follow his heart," said Langford about Monroe's work in Guatemala.

One of the College of Law team's first activities during their "volunteer vacation" was hanging chain nets at a concrete basketball/soccer/volleyball court. In addition, the team delivered balls and bats for use by the children at their new sports venue. When the alumni arrived at the concrete slab, more than 100 children were eagerly waiting to use the court. "The kids were happier than any of us could imagine," recalled Langford.

The 450-square-foot, concrete block home on which the law graduates worked is 30 minutes outside of Panajachel, in a hilly, rural area. Because of the terrain and location of the site, the tasks performed by the alumni during their trip were arduous. Much of the work involved hauling heavy items – buckets of sand and rock, concrete blocks, and large, irregularly shaped stones averaging 30 pounds each – up a steep, 400-plus yard hill to the building site. They also dug three-foot-wide trenches for the home's foundation with pickaxes and shovels; bent, tied and laid rebar; and poured concrete that they had mixed by hand.

Although the home has no electricity or running water, and only consists of three rooms, it is like a mansion compared to the family's previous home. When the alumni were in Guatemala in April, the family was living in a home with a dirt floor and walls made of corn stalks.

"I would describe the trip as perspective changing," said

Langford. "It made me realize how fortunate we are to live not only in a country that is free – a democracy – but also a country that has the rule of law, where everything isn't for sale. Where principles do apply and mean something."

In addition to working hard during their mission trip, the alumni also played hard. They shopped in the local village, zip-lined and enjoyed wonderful meals accompanied by live music, often played by Monroe's band. They also formed strong bonds among themselves and with the family, the members of which had worked side-by-side with the team to build the home they would inhabit. On the last working day of the trip, lunchtime included gift giving.

"The gifts included pots and pans, shoes, old tennis balls and tooth brushes," said Langford. "It was a beautiful moment, with silent tears welling up inside of the gringos. We had worked with this family for most of the week and departing left a hole in all our hearts."

Wayne Hogan Named Justice Teaching Volunteer of the Year



This was a year of great success for the law school. The reputation of our outstanding students, faculty and alumni continues to blossom.

Private fundraising made a critical difference at the law school, helping us to attract and to retain the best students and faculty. Our Annual Fund has been an unprecedented success, and our new major gifts are already making a difference.

ANNUAL GIVING FROM STUDENTS AND ALUMNI

This past year, 88.64% of our students contributed to our Annual Fund. Our student enthusiasm and generosity bodes well for the future. They are blazing the trail for us all!

An all-time high of 28.18% of our alumni made cash gifts to the law school! Based on current American Bar Association data, this level of participation should keep us within the nation's top 10 law schools in terms of alumni giving rate. This level of alumni support sends a powerful signal about the enthusiasm our alumni have for the school.

MAJOR GIFTS

This past year, we received Major Gifts totaling \$916,672 in cash and \$600,000 in additional pledges, for a grand total of \$1,516,672. Endowed Gift Opportunities

ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS

Our single greatest need from private giving is endowed scholarships. Our tuition has steadily increased and is likely to continue to do so. To continue to serve our mission of providing access to all, including those from families of modest means, we will need significantly more scholarships. Scholarships are awarded according to the intent of the donor and can be based on merit, need or other factors.

The minimum gift needed to endow a scholarship at Florida State University College of Law is \$25,000.

ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIPS AND CHAIRS

A 2012 update of *Leiter's Law School Rankings* rated our faculty 33rd best in the country in terms of per capita scholarly impact. We would not have this extraordinary faculty without private giving. Professorships and chairs give us the merit money we need to attract and to retain this top faculty. As they get better and better, we need to do more and more.

Endowed professorships and chairs provide salary supplements based on merit. Faculty members are appointed for five-year terms, with renewal contingent on continued scholarly productivity. The appointee bears the name of the donor or the donor's designee.

The minimum gift needed to endow a professorship at Florida State University College of Law is \$200,000. The minimum gift needed to endow a chair at Florida State Law is \$1,000,000.



ENDOWMENTS FOR EXCELLENCE

Endowments for Excellence leave it to the discretion of the school how to spend income earned on endowment.

The minimum gift needed to create an Endowment for Excellence is \$25,000.

DONOR RECOGNITION

We are delighted to recognize scholarships, professorships and other targeted gifts by naming them in honor of the donor or the donor's designee. In addition, we are pleased to acknowledge inter vivos gifts of \$200,000 or more with an oil portrait of the donor or the donor's designee that will be displayed in a prominent place at the law school.

The new Advocacy Center gives us a series of supplemental donor recognition possibilities for gifts ranging from \$25,000 to \$5 million.

Recent Larger Gifts

We would like to specially thank those of you who made a larger gift commitment between July 1, 2011 and June 30, 2012. These gifts make it possible to continue the dynamic advance of the academic programs and reputation of the law school.

\$100,000 OR MORE

F. Philip Blank ('75) and his wife Rita have pledged \$250,000 over time, 80% of which will be used to support the Alumni Centennial Chair (also known as the Dean's Chair) and 20% of which shall be expended annually to fund the Blank-Miller Scholarship. The Blank-Miller Scholarship supports students at our school who have financial need. In recognition of this latest commitment, the law school is delighted to name the Main Conference Room in the Advocacy Center the Phil and Rita Blank Conference Room. This is but the latest in a series of gifts by Phil and Rita to the law school. They have regularly donated scholarships to support our students in financial need. In addition, in 2002, Phil and Rita funded additional scholarships for our students who are direct descendants of Holocaust survivors. Phil also made an earlier gift of \$50,000 to the Alumni Centennial Chair.

An anonymous donor has made a cash gift of \$200,000 to create the Glass Professorship in the Public Interest Law Center. The income from this endowment shall be used to recruit or retain an exceptional clinical professor for the Public Interest Law Center. This generous gift is yet another testament to the wonderful and important work of our clinical faculty.

The Middle Road Foundation has made a pledge of \$150,000 over five years to create the Middle Road Foundation Endowment for Excellence and a cash gift of \$25,000 to create the FSU

Law School Awards Fund. The income from the Middle Road Foundation Endowment for Excellence shall be used at the discretion of the law school for purposes such as financial aid for students, faculty incentives and funding for student organizations. Tallahassee civil rights attorneys Tommy Warren ('74) and Kathy Villacorta ('77) have made a cash gift of \$100,000 to supplement and expand the existing Calvin Patterson Civil Rights Endowed Scholarship, which the couple established in 2004 with a \$100,000 gift. In recognition of the additional gift, the Admissions Office in the law school's new Advocacy Center will be named the Calvin Patterson Admissions Office. 


CHART 1 2011-2012 Total Cash Received \$1,442,316*





Mock Trial Team Begins Competition Season With First Place National Title


The Florida State University College of Law Mock Trial Team won first place in the 2012 National Criminal Trial Advocacy Competition held in San Francisco on October 11-14. The competition was sponsored by California Attorneys for Criminal Justice (CACJ) and the University of California - Hastings College of the Law. Twenty-two teams from 17 law schools competed in the event, including teams from University of California - Berkeley School of Law, Fordham University School of Law, University of California - Hastings College of the Law, University of Houston Law Center, Pepperdine University School of Law and University of San Diego School of Law.

Winning team members are third-year law students Nicholas Horton, from Cincinnati, Ohio, Adrian Mood, from Lancaster, South Carolina, Peter Tragos, from Clearwater, Florida, and Sean Wiggins, from Gainesville, Florida. Mood also received the competition's George Porter Award for Outstanding Achievement. The team was coached by Tom Kirwin ('79), who recently retired and previously was deputy chief financial officer at the Florida Department of Financial Services, and Richard Tanner, who is managing partner of the Tallahassee office of deBeaubien, Knight, Simmons, Mantzaris & Neal, LLP.

"We are all so proud of our Mock Trial students for winning this national competition," said Dean Don Weidner. "Special thanks go to these gifted student competitors, to their coaches, and to Faculty Advisor Ruth Stone."

The competition problem involved a charge of murder, due to a drive-by shooting, with a gang enhancement charge. The final round judges were Federal District Court Judge William Alsup, of the Northern District of California, California Superior Judge Ann Moorman and CACJ Past-President Ted Cassman.

This mock trial victory adds to a long list of recent competition successes for Florida State's advocacy teams. Since 2010, the Moot Court Team has won first place in nine national competitions and in one international competition. For two consecutive years, the Mock Trial Team has won first place

Graham won the award for Best Advocate and Emmanuel took home the Best Witness recognition.

For the third time in five years, the Florida State University College of Law Student Bar Association (SBA) was named "SBA of the Year" by the American Bar Association's (ABA) Law Student Division. The honor was announced Saturday, Aug. 4, at the ABA Annual Meeting in Chicago. The award recognizes the efforts of an SBA organization to create a better environment for law students and a more positive image of the legal profession.

Florida State's SBA also won the ABA Law Student Division's 2012 Henry J. Ramsey, Jr. Diversity Award. According to the ABA, the award recognizes excellence in activities that have contributed toward the achievement and advancement of women, minorities, persons with disabilities in the profession and lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons.

Florida State won two of the six national awards presented at the annual meeting. Eighteen schools from around the nation competed for "SBA of the Year" and 17 schools competed for the Diversity Award.

Florida State's SBA was honored following a year of many accomplishments. During the 2011-2012 academic year, SBA added events to its community service campaign, including the first Habitat for Humanity project with a local law firm. SBA expanded its annual Legislative Preview event into a Distinguished Lecture Series, bringing several distinguished political figures to the law school to meet with students. SBA expanded its Diversity Week initiative, partnering with more student organizations than in the past and adding events, such as a Study Abroad Panel. SBA also was instrumental in helping the law school reach an all-time high student giving rate - 88% of students made cash gifts to the college during the 2012 Student Annual Fund Drive.

"We are thrilled that the excellence of our Student Bar Association is again being lauded at the national level," said Dean Don Weidner. "Congratulations and thanks go to the entire SBA board and especially to its immediate-past president, Alexandra Haddad, for Florida State's award-winning submission."

DeMeo ('85), the current chair of The Florida Bar's Animal Law Committee, gave a lecture to approximately 35 students on animal law legislation.

Wall Street Journal: Florida State 25th Best for J.D. Jobs

National unemployment rates have been a hot topic in the media this year, as have law school graduate employment rates. The *Wall Street Journal* recently reported that Florida State University College of Law is the nation's 25th best law school in terms of placing graduates in jobs that require law degrees. Most of the schools in the top 25 are private schools, further highlighting the impressive rating. Dean Don Weidner credits the law school's engaged and helpful alumni with placing graduates.

"We owe our student successes to our supportive alumni and especially to the leadership on our boards," said Dean Don Weidner. "I thank every alum who has brought a job opportunity, even the opportunity for an unpaid internship, to our attention. There is only one way to achieve high placement numbers—one job at a time."

Assistant Dean for Placement Rosanna Catalano believes it's vital for students to connect with employers in a myriad of ways.

"Most of the jobs in the legal marketplace are not advertised, so we feel it is important to connect our students with potential employers through many different avenues, whether it's a lunch with a mentor in an off-campus setting, a local bar association event or an alumni event," said Catalano.

Florida State 3rd Best for Hispanic Students

Hispanic Business magazine has named Florida State University College of Law the third best law school in the nation for Hispanic students. This is the second consecutive year Florida State is third on the list and the ninth year in a row that the College of Law has been named one of the top 10 law schools for Hispanic students. The 2012 rankings were released Aug. 28.

The magazine based its rankings on the following criteria: Hispanic student enrollment, Hispanic faculty members, Hispanic student retention rates, degrees conferred to Hispanics, progressive programs aimed at increasing enrollment of Hispanic students and school reputation as reflected in *U.S. News & World Report*.

"Best Value" Ranking

The National Jurist magazine has ranked Florida State University College of Law the 12th best value law school in the nation. The ranking, published in *The National Jurist's* September 2012 issue, weighs important student outcomes – bar passage rate and employment rate – against tuition, cost of living and indebtedness. According to *The National Jurist*, the rankings are "designed to find the law schools where graduates have the best chance of passing the bar and getting a legal job, without taking on a ton of debt." Florida State is the only law school in Florida ranked in the top 20.

The national ranking, which also will be published in the fall issue of *preLaw* magazine, reflects the College of Law's strong student outcomes. For nine of the last 14 administrations of the Florida Bar Examination, Florida State's bar passage rate was either first or second among Florida's 11 law schools.



More Federal Judges Visit Florida State



The Honorable Ed Carnes, of the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Judicial Circuit, visited the law school in August. Carnes also spoke to the faculty. This presentation was titled, "Who Will Write This Ignorant Man's State Papers: Lincoln's Lessons for Lawyers (and Law Professors) on Writing."



The Honorable Robert Hinkle, of the United States District Court for the Northern District of Florida, visited campus in September. Judge Hinkle talked about the role law clerks play in the federal court system and provided insight on what judges look for in applicants. He also discussed the application process in general. Many students took the opportunity to listen to the local federal judge, who has hired a significant number of Florida State Law students.



Additionally, the Honorable Fortunato Benavides visited the law school in October. He currently serves as a member of the United States Judicial Conference Committee on the Administration of the Bankruptcy System. In February of this year, he took senior status and serves as a senior judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Judicial Circuit. Benavides led an informal discussion with faculty members focusing on what law schools are doing well to prepare oral advocates and what can be done to improve the preparation. He also met with Mock Trial and Moot Court students.
