Responding to the Market



This is a time of great change for legal education. The marketplace of employers is demanding that new law graduates be better prepared to add value to their organizations. We are responding by enhancing our professional skills training both in transactional lawyering and in litigation skills.

New Business Program

At Florida State, our newest “big” program—which we have been assembling over the last six years or so—is our business program. I believe we now have the best business and tax program in Florida and one of the best in the region. The business and tax team was rounded out this year with the addition of two new faculty members: former federal bankruptcy judge Bruce Markell and lawyer-economist Murat Mungan.

We have the largest and most sophisticated business law faculty group in the history of our law school. As a result, we are able to offer more business courses than ever. Indeed, we now offer a Certificate in Business for our J.D. students. Course offerings include for example, Closely-Held Businesses, Business Planning, Public Corporations, Corporate Finance, Law and Economics, Antitrust, Dodd-Frank, Securities Regulation and Corporate Compliance. I am particularly proud of our new basic business course: Introduction to Business and Finance. This course includes basics of financial accounting (how to read income and expense statements and balance sheets), financial principles and products, and statistics for lawyers. The new business program also includes skills courses, such as business internships with corporations, Contract Drafting and, beginning this spring, *The Anatomy of a Deal*. We are also offering Practicums—one-hour skills supplements to traditional classroom offerings. For example, this spring an experienced commercial real estate practitioner will offer a one-hour supplement to my Real Estate Finance course. She will take student teams through negotiations of a commercial contract of sale, lease and loan agreement.

This new business program will help our graduates hit the ground running, whether they begin working as transactional

lawyers or as commercial litigators. It will also enable our students who become government lawyers to be better prepared to deal with the private sector.

Enhanced Litigation Program

Our litigation program has been enhanced by the addition of the five courtrooms in our new Advocacy Center—four of them with jury boxes. Starting with the first year of law school, every student is required to argue in the intimidating environment of a proper courtroom. Our Moot Court and Mock Trial Teams have gone from rags to riches in terms of their practice facilities. The practical training has also been enhanced by the addition of a third “live-client” clinic: our Medical-Legal Partnership, in which clinical faculty and students take on as legal clients selected patients from a medical clinic near campus. Litigation training is also more thorough than ever because we are increasingly offering more granular courses to prepare our students to begin their careers as litigators. For example, we are currently offering for the first time a course on Jury Selection. Next fall, we shall offer our first full course on Depositions. Finally, our wonderful Externship program includes more offerings than ever.

Broader Perspectives

We have not thrown the baby out with the bathwater. An important part of our program is to make sure our students are exposed to legal and social history as well as to the insights of other academic disciplines, such as economics and psychology. Now more than ever, we combine the best of analytical legal education with the highest level of professional skills training.

Melanie Shoemaker Griffin: YLD President and More

Wonderfully generous. Compassionate. Infectiously enthusiastic. Inspiring. Some of the state's most successful lawyers have used those words to describe Melanie Shoemaker Griffin.

Griffin's friend and classmate Barbara Leach ('07) describes the 2006 College of Law graduate as "a perfect mix of energy and optimism, determination and graciousness. She is the most disciplined person I know. Whatever goal she sets for herself, she achieves, whether that's in the courtroom, in the boardroom, in a familial setting, it doesn't matter. She is more capable of juggling friendships, relationships, cases and philanthropic endeavors than anyone I've ever met."

Griffin also can be described much more basically as a planner. When she was in grade school, Griffin's plan to practice law took shape.

"I wanted to go to law school since I was about 8 years old. I dressed up as an attorney for Halloween and decided that I would pass out candy as opposed to going trick-or-treating," said Griffin, whose costume included fake eyeglasses and a briefcase.

As a junior at Manatee High School in Bradenton, Griffin formulated a plan to attend Florida State. "I came for an American Legion Girls State program and fell in love with Tallahassee and the Capitol and knew that I wanted to come

to school here."

When she was finished, Griffin had earned three degrees from the university – a bachelor's degree in business finance, a J.D. and an M.B.A. She worked in state government the entire time she was a student.

Upon graduation from law school, Griffin joined Dean Mead's Orlando office, where she had previously served as a summer clerk. She has consistently been one of the firm's top performing associates and, in just her fourth year of practice, was one of the youngest attorneys in the firm's history to earn an AV rating.

Early in her career, Griffin conceived a plan to serve among the leadership ranks of several professional organizations. Griffin has served as president of the Central Florida Association for Women Lawyers (CFAWL) and on the boards of The Florida Bar Young Lawyers Division and the Young Lawyers Section of the Orange County Bar Association. Under Griffin's engaging leadership, CFAWL's membership doubled and event attendance skyrocketed. At the end of her presidency, CFAWL was named chapter of the year by the Florida Association for Women Lawyers.

In June of 2013, Griffin reached another major milestone when she was installed as president of The Florida Bar Young Lawyers Division (YLD).

"When she was getting sworn in, she made a point to do the Seminole chop from the podium at the general assembly of The Florida Bar," said Sean Desmond ('00), who served as president of the YLD from 2011-12. "That was an awesome thing for me to see as a Florida State alum."

"It's been really fun," said Griffin a few months into her presidency. "There are two initiatives that have been significant priorities for the YLD and things that we've already accomplished. One is communications. That is one of the most simple and important things you can do for an organization – to ensure that you are communicating effectively and pushing out information about which members need to be informed. We have increased our social media presence and newsletter communications, publishing an issue about every two weeks."

"The YLD is also focused on helping to lead the Bar on technology issues. It is something that young lawyers are facing every day – for example, how do we handle increased e-mail communication without having the length of time that we used to have to think about our responses."

In line with those priorities, Griffin can be especially proud of a social media campaign that resulted in 2,000-plus new Facebook and Twitter followers for the YLD and YLD Law Student Division groups. The campaign also

raised more than \$2,000 for The Florida Bar Foundation. Additionally, Griffin has used the newsletter to educate law students and recent graduates about how to best transition into practice and about the resources the Bar can provide.

In terms of technology, the YLD has started a monthly lunchtime Webinar series. The first Webinar was held in August and addressed technology issues in the practice of law. That event garnered 10 times the number of attendees compared to Webinars hosted previously by the division. “It shows that members really are craving that type of education. A big part of the reason we had that jump is, not only is there such an interest in it, but we also now have the communication systems, through our newsletters, social media and our Web site, that members actually know what education we can provide.”

Another priority for Griffin is the expansion of the division’s “Mentoring with the Masters” program, which is a series of short videos that provide practical advice to young lawyers about topics like deposing a witness. Griffin aims to triple the number of videos posted online during her presidency.

Because Griffin is extremely passionate about mentoring, it is fitting that the endeavor is central to her presidency. Griffin has dozens of mentees located across Florida. She even helped establish a 1L mentoring program at FAMU’s law school. An extremely engaged alumnus, Griffin also makes time to help students at Florida State. During one busy week in September, she had dinner and lunch with Florida State law students, counseling them on networking and the legal profession.

“There were people along the way for me, who really shaped my life and helped me get where I am today by mentoring me and opening doors that would have otherwise been closed. So, from a very early age I thought it was important to give back and pay it forward,” said Griffin, whose most influential mentors include Sean Desmond, Renee Thompson, who is another former YLD president, and Barbara Leach, who is the current CFAWL president. “So, I

have taken a huge interest in mentoring. It is critical that law school students get input from attorneys about their law school journeys and future practice of law.”

Although Griffin will travel 30-40 weeks during her year-long presidency, she still is very committed to her substantive practice. Support from her firm and her penchant for planning have allowed Griffin to stay productive.

“My firm and I both prepared – thinking that it would be more challenging for me to keep up with my client work, but I actually am going to end up exceeding the firm’s billing requirement this year,” said Griffin. “My firm has everything set up so well. Not only online, but even my desk phone rings simultaneously to my cell phone. It allows me to be out of the office and not worry about being able to effectively

serve clients.”

During her seven years in Dean Mead’s commercial litigation department, Griffin’s top priority has been her clients. “It’s really important to me to maintain a substantive practice and be taken seriously in that realm, not just someone who is involved in bar activities. What has been great is the client relationships I have developed – I have clients now that I’ve worked with for most of my career. You develop a

special relationship and I don’t want to let them down.”

Focusing on business and complex commercial litigation, Griffin specializes in contract disputes, including prosecuting and defending non-competition, non-solicitation and confidentiality cases for her business clients. She has had great success obtaining preliminary injunctions and temporary restraining orders in federal court and in the Orange County Business Court, where she almost exclusively practices.

“I cannot imagine a better place to work because of the opportunities,” said Griffin about Dean Mead. Very early in her career, Griffin was handed the reins to take a lead role in her cases, taking depositions and often appearing in court. “They have also been supportive of me being involved in the community,

thus not only giving me a large role in the substantive part of my job, but also allowing me to have a large role in contributing to the profession.”

Most people would look at Griffin’s schedule and become overwhelmed, but Griffin says keeping up with her many responsibilities is, “surprisingly easy, as long as I remain flexible.” Griffin has her single mother, Jean Shoemaker, to thank for her can-do attitude and ability to accomplish more than might seem possible to others.

“I’ve never actually met anyone with more energy than Melanie. I don’t know how she does what she does, but she is incredible,” said Desmond, who quickly realized what an asset Griffin was when she joined the YLD board on which he was already serving. Desmond made sure his mentee was assigned to lead key projects even though there were more senior members on the board.

“You can’t bench your best player,” joked Desmond.

“I was on a schedule from an early age,” said Griffin about the roots of her ability to effectively juggle competing priorities. “One day was dance and one day was piano lessons and one day was choir and one day was church. I remember that even from Kindergarten. For me, being busy and balancing different activities – my mom always encouraged me to explore – wasn’t a big deal. Also, my mom didn’t really allow me to watch T.V. So, T.V. has never been that important to me. Sometimes I wake up and realize that I haven’t watched T.V. in a week.”

A social worker by profession, Griffin’s mother also passed along to her daughter a compassion for people.

In addition to mentoring students and young lawyers, Griffin has worked with detained female juveniles and garnered substantial support for an Orlando-area Title I elementary school.

“My mom really cared about giving back to the community, being a genuine person and being true to others. From an early age those values were also important to me, and a skill that I developed over the years. To me, it is important to appreciate people and have a positive attitude as a leader.”

When not practicing law or serving her community and profession, Griffin has a fulfilling personal life. Most of her spare time is spent with husband Mike Griffin, a commercial real estate broker.

Melanie and Mike became friends during their senior year of high school, after meeting at a student government leadership conference. They began dating while Melanie was in law school and became engaged shortly after she graduated. On the morning of their wedding in February 2009, they ran the Gasparilla 15K race before exchanging vows that afternoon.

“It was really fun,” recalled Griffin. “He wore a shirt that said, ‘I am marrying her today,’ and I had one that conversely said, ‘I am marrying him today.’ It was something fun for us to do together before all of our friends and family joined us for the rest of the day.”

The Griffins still run together on the weekends. They also enjoy attending college football games together – Mike is chair-elect of the University of South Florida’s national alumni association – and share a love of wine. The couple has been to Napa Valley three times in the past five years, once during their

honeymoon and most recently after an American Bar Association meeting that Griffin attended in San Francisco.

“Mike and I have known each other almost half of our lives,” said Griffin. “He has helped me in the second part of my life in terms of bouncing ideas off of him, getting feedback about things professionally and learning to have fun.”

Up until this point, Griffin’s plans have been very concrete – earn her law degree and M.B.A, marry her best friend, work for a firm that represents business clients, serve as CFAWL president and serve as president of The Florida Bar Young Lawyers Division. She will be eligible to become a partner at Dean Mead at the end of 2014, so that goal also is within sight.

After that, Griffin admits there are many question marks in her future. Although she finds herself for the first time without a plan, the Florida State law school community is sure to be impressed and inspired by Griffin for years to come.

“She really is, first and foremost, a model Florida State Seminole,” said Mike. “When you look at the type of leaders that FSU has produced, particularly the College of Law, she is following in the footsteps of so many people before her who really set a high bar. As proud as I am of her personal and civic accomplishments, when she received her AV rating very early in her career and the peer recognitions that come with the *Florida Trend* and *Super Lawyers* recognitions, that is a validation that her professional peers respect her work product, in addition to everything else she does, which is truly incredible.” ■

Robert Rigsby: Enriching Invesco In-House

Invesco's Robert Rigsby vividly remembers the morning in December 2009 when the global investment management company went public on the New York Stock Exchange.

"Our senior leadership team went to New York to ring the opening bell for our move to the New York Stock Exchange from the London Stock

Exchange," recalled Rigsby, who is managing director of Invesco's corporate legal department and also executive vice president, general counsel and secretary of Invesco Mortgage Capital Inc. "I was on the phone in the background talking to the transfer agent, who was advising me they were not sure we would be up and running by the time the bell rings.

I was trying to make sure that we didn't have a false start on the first day. Luckily everything came out okay."

While Rigsby's days are not all as pressure filled, he does have a full plate. "My job is to counsel executive and senior management on legal issues, to frame those issues in a way that the business team understands, to highlight the risk associated with activities and to find ways to mitigate that risk in an acceptable manner while remaining within compliance of law," said Rigsby. "And I manage a team of lawyers who do that type of work.

"I really enjoy developing the attorneys who work for me, it's very rewarding. That's a very big thing at Invesco – employee development. We don't make widgets or iPhones. Our product is intellectual capital. We like to say that our product walks out of the building every night and every morning we need to make sure that they show back up and run the ship." Rigsby credits his boss, who he also views as his mentor and friend, with instilling in him the value of developing lawyers who work for him.

Rigsby also recalls the financial crises in 2008 as a standout period at Invesco. "Those were some pretty scary times," recalled Rigsby. "It's interesting — we have two different trading floors. And those are what you think of, where you have people sitting at desks and they've

got 8-10 monitors wrapped around them and they are trading. However, it is not like you see in the movies where people are yelling and screaming. It is very quiet because people are concentrating intensely on what they are doing. But when the financial crisis occurred, the level of buzz was jacked up quite a bit. That was a pretty intense period of time. But we have such a strong leadership team at Invesco that the company came out stronger and is one of the leaders in the industry.”

Although Rigsby loves practicing law, he did not envision this path. “I went to college thinking that I would be an orthodontist and I found out that I didn’t like chemistry,” said Rigsby. “I then thought I would go into accounting and didn’t care for the professor that the accounting department put before freshman, I guess to weed them out. Then had the same experience in computer science and then ended up in political science and had a great professor who I became good friends with and who was my academic advisor. He and I talked a lot and I decided to go to law school from there based on his advice and counseling.”

Rigsby tells a similar story about how he settled on his practice area. “I clearly remember walking in the door my first day as a lawyer in Pensacola after graduating from law school, saying, ‘I am going to be a utility/regulatory lawyer for the rest of my career.’ I was hired to do utility work – that law firm was essentially the corporate counsel for Gulf Power. One day I bumped into one of the partners there that did not do that work. He was kind of a quiet guy and he is basically the business lawyer.”

Under the tutelage of that partner, who Rigsby cites as another great mentor and friend, Rigsby switched his specialization to general corporate law. He also applied to “tax school” and earned an LL.M. in Taxation from the University of Florida in 1995. After earning his LL.M., Rigsby practiced at Rogers Towers in Jacksonville and then at Sutherland in Atlanta. During his interview process with Sutherland, Rigsby was forced to choose between corporate law and tax law, as both departments wanted to hire him.

“Tax school was very difficult for me. The learning curve was extremely sharp and tax did not come natural. But corporate law and mergers and acquisitions, that comes very natural for me. So I chose the more natural path of the corporate department at Sutherland.”

Rigsby’s practice at Sutherland was virtually 100% mergers and acquisitions and 95% of his time was spent on work for one particular client – a water company. “I decided to leave the firm when that client got bought by a French conglomerate and the partner that I was working for got elected managing partner. I really found that I loved working with one client and getting to know the business and the personalities. So I decided to go in-house. In addition, I have an M.B.A. so working directly for a company would allow me to draw upon my business-side knowledge and skill set.”

Rigsby had offers from Siemens in Atlanta and arch rival GE in Connecticut. He chose Siemens because he had just bought a house in Atlanta. Ironically, Rigsby landed in Siemens’ New York City office a few years later.

However, in 2007, Rigsby moved back to Atlanta to head Invesco’s corporate legal department.

Although Atlanta has been Rigsby’s home for the past 15 years, he grew up in Gulf Breeze and is reconnecting with his Florida roots. He recently finished building a vacation home in Rosemary Beach.

“I fell in love with it and never thought I could afford to live here,” said Rigsby, who had vacationed in the community. “During the Greek Euro crisis I made a ridiculously short-sale offer on a carriage house that had been basically shuttered and abandoned by a builder who went bankrupt. The bank accepted the offer, so I got an incredible deal and finished off the carriage house and then worked with a good friend who is an architect and built the main house.”

In addition to reconnecting with old friends from his youth in northwest Florida, Rigsby has recently re-engaged with the law school. In November, as a member of the Class of 1993’s Homecoming Reunion Committee, Rigsby returned to the law school for the first time in 20 years. And this past spring he met virtually with Florida State law students to give them career advice and talk to them about the benefits of in-house opportunities.

“I have a different experience – being an in-house lawyer – than what a lot of students are striving for,” said Rigsby. “I think their mentality is, ‘I’m going to go work at a big law firm.’ They don’t consider in-house life and they should be thinking about in-house life when they are at the large law firms, if they want to position themselves for that later in their careers.” ■

Felicia Leborgne Nowels: Helping Businesses Trade Across Borders

After graduating from Davidson College with a degree in French, and concentration in International Relations, Felicia Leborgne Nowels packed her bags and moved to Paris for work. Because she also was engaged to her college sweetheart, Matthew Nowels, her stay in France did not last long. Shortly after returning to the states to join her husband, who was in Tallahassee at the Florida State University College of Law, Nowels decided to further her studies in law school.

“I had such an incredibly positive experience at law school that I really felt that the law was what I did want to do. It was sort of accidental in that it wasn’t a lifelong goal that I wanted to pursue the law, it was simply the right choice at the time and that choice was cemented in law school,” said Nowels, who was Florida State’s first intern at the International Bar Association in London.

More than a decade and three children later, the 2003 graduate has a thriving law practice in Tallahassee. Raised in Miami by Uruguayan immigrants, Nowels loves different cultures and was drawn to international law. A few years out of law school, she further honed her areas of expertise and now specializes in international trade and customs law at Akerman LLP, and is board certified in International Law by The Florida Bar.

“My practice is very dynamic — I absolutely love what I do,” said Nowels, who is very involved in The Florida Bar. “I help entities with the movement of goods and services. I help foreign companies get their products into the United States, not only physically, but also on a regulatory level. And then I also help domestic companies take their products and services abroad. A big component of what I do is regulatory compliance — supply chain security, export controls, licensing, regulatory standards.

“I deal with a lot of different products and a lot of different industries, so I have a nice flavor of federal regulatory matters overlapping with trade matters.” Nowels’

clients span different industries including drugs, medical devices, cosmetics, foods, consumer electronics, apparel, jewelry, live animals and antiquities.

“I love the people I meet through my job,” said Nowels. “I really focus on understanding my clients’ needs and how I can help achieve those needs. And I am fascinated by how products are made, how they are traded, how they benefit our lives. And I thrive on being a part of solving business issues.”

With clients all over the world – including Samsung and the company best known for its No. 2 pencils (Dixon Ticonderoga) – the multi-lingual Nowels is no stranger to international travel. She was in China in April, Paris and Vienna in the summer, and also has been to Brazil a few times and the British Virgin Islands in 2013 alone. She also frequently works in Washington, D.C. — where the federal agencies that regulate her clients are located — and port towns, including Miami and New York City.

While travel is an exciting component of her job, Nowels appreciates her home base in Akerman’s Tallahassee office.

“Tallahassee has been a very generous and gentlemanly place to learn the practice of law. And this office and this firm have been extremely supportive of me, of my desire to practice in and grow this area of law,” said Nowels, who became a shareholder in 2012. She counts many Tallahassee-based Akerman partners among her mentors, including Silvia Alderman (’77), Kathi Giddings (’92), Marty Dix (’85) and Tom Range (’02).

Nowels also has given a great deal

back to the Tallahassee community. Because of a love for art that was nurtured during her internship at the Louvre, Nowels became involved in, and eventually presided over, the Mary Brogan Museum of Art and Science Board of Directors. Nowels also sits on the boards of the American Red Cross, Capital Area Chapter and the Economic Development Council of Tallahassee/Leon County, International Business Council. Most recently, Nowels has been appointed to sit on the U.S. Department of Commerce’s Florida District Export Council, through which she helps serve as a resource for Florida’s exporters.

Nowels has three very good reasons to be invested in Tallahassee: her children. With husband Matthew (’01), who practices at Blank & Meenan, Nowels seems to effortlessly balance work and raising 7-year-old John Christian, 5-year-old Antonia and 3-year-old Matthew. Nowels recalls that her parents, Martha and Juan Martin Leborgne, were amazing examples of how to have successful careers and personal lives.

“My goal is to be the role model to my children that my mother and father are for me,” said Nowels. “Both of them are professionals. My mother opened her shop, Country French, when I was three and it is the best store in the world. She singlehandedly made it a huge success. And my father was a leading radiologist [now retired]. Both of them are so passionate and found things that they really loved to do and have incredible work ethic, but before that, a strong sense of family. I never saw family sacrificed for their careers



or have known them to have suffered in their careers because of family.”

Her parents’ passion for their interests has had a lasting impression on Nowels as she pursues her career and extracurricular activities. A former “ballerina,” Nowels reconnected with that passion from her childhood after a friend told her about an adult ballet class a few years ago. She now combines her passions and serves on The Tallahassee Ballet Board of Directors.

As her children are entering the ages where sports matches and dance recitals will populate the family calendar, Nowels will have more to balance. Fortunately, she has a strong support system.

“I am so grateful to many people – the village, as it were,” said the working mom. “I am not from here, so my parents, brother and sister and my in-laws don’t live here. But, when I do have to go on long trips they come to the rescue, so that is amazingly wonderful. My husband is the best husband and father – he does an enormous amount. Florida State Welcomes Three New Full-Time Faculty Members

Location, location, location. Florida State's three new full-time faculty members know a thing or two about the importance of location. Jeffrey A. Stoops Professor Bruce A. Markell, a former federal bankruptcy judge, loves traveling and was in Japan when the Fukushima earthquake struck. Assistant Professor Murat C. Mungan, a native of Turkey, frequently travels internationally and nationally. Assistant Professor Mary Ziegler left her small hometown of Butte, Montana, to attend Harvard.

Before joining the law school's faculty, Professor Markell was a United States Bankruptcy Judge in Nevada and a member of the Bankruptcy Appellate Panel for the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. He also was a professor at the William S. Boyd School of Law at the University of Nevada Las Vegas and practiced law privately in Los Angeles for nine years. Markell taught Secured Transactions in the fall and will teach Bankruptcy in the spring. Because of his experience on the bench, he incorporates real-life experiences into the classroom.

"When you teach, you're teaching

principles of law," said Markell. "My background gives me the opportunity to pick from examples in real life so students don't think you're doing something that's disconnected from reality."

As someone who held a judicial clerkship post-graduation and who served as a judge, Professor Markell is focused on helping students learn more about the judicial clerkship application process and what to expect during a clerkship.

"My clerkship was one of the best

years of my life," said Markell. "Even though I wanted to do a transactional practice, the appellate clerkship was still very interesting and I have a lot of respect for the judge I worked for. A lot of students don't know about these clerkships and I want to let them know what's out there and get them geared up for it. It's a great time in your life to do something like that and probably the only time in your life you can."

A former camp counselor and canoe instructor turned academic, Markell loves traveling and, through his interest in genealogy, has traced his surname back to someone named "Carlos" born in New York in either 1804 or 1805. His greatest source of pride are his two daughters, Amanda and Michelle.

Professor Mungan, who was a visiting professor before joining the faculty permanently, was ranked fourth in his native country of Turkey for aggressive in-line skating when he was 17 years old. Although he successfully finished a Ph.D. in Economics and obtained his J.D. degree simultaneously in 5 years, his greatest accomplishment is being voted school president of his high school.

“That was a hard thing to do (being voted school president). Everybody who studies hard enough can get a Ph.D. and a J.D,” said Mungan. “There were 400 votes possible and I think I got 371, so it was a very big victory. Being in high school in Istanbul was the best time of my life.”

Professor Mungan teaches courses offered in the business program at the law school, including Law and Economics, Introduction to Finance and Business, Antitrust and Corporations.

“I use modern economics to shed light on the incentive, behavioral, and welfare aspects of legal rules,” said Mungan. “My work generally applies microeconomic theory, including game theory, to study optimal law enforcement strategies, antitrust, innovation and intellectual property.”

It was during a stint at a 9-to-5 job that Mungan knew teaching was the perfect profession for him: “I was extremely bored in that job, working 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in a cubicle staring at a computer the whole time. I knew I had to do something with more flexibility and where I can use my creativity on my own and not be responsible to other people in terms of what I have to write about. I don’t think I could work any-

with Florida State’s talented, diverse and enthusiastic student body: “It feels like a lot of our students really want to be lawyers; they are really passionate about the law. I have a 1L class that’s great; it’s really diverse and I think that’s striking. There can be a feeling of diversity for the sake of diversity but it doesn’t feel like that here, it just feels like they are naturally talented and not all the same.”

When she’s not in the classroom, she likes spending time with her husband, going to the gym and reading for fun. She also writes short stories in her spare time, a hobby she’s been participating in most of her life.

“I did a lot of writing short stories in college and when I was younger,” said Ziegler. “I never did it very seriously but when I was in undergrad I won some money from it. Montana is beautiful so the fact that I love the outdoors and go outdoors all the time kind of came from that. When you’re a child growing up there that’s sort of naturally what you do for fun.” ■

Charter-Class Professor David Dickson Passes Away

One of the College of Law's first professors passed away on September 25, 2013 in Fernandina Beach, Florida. David Franklin Dickson, a professor at Florida State Law from the time it was founded until 1999, touched many lives during his time on campus.

The son of an army man, Dickson graduated high school in Munich, Germany and went on to earn his undergraduate degree from Princeton University in 1954. Following his time at Princeton, he was commissioned a 2nd lieutenant in the Army and found himself again in Germany. He ended his 25-year Army Reserves career as a colonel with the 400th Military Police Company in Tallahassee.

Dickson earned his law degree from Yale University. Primarily teaching U.S. Constitutional Law, Advanced Family Law and Florida Constitutional Law during his time at the College of Law, he served as an advisor to the Florida Legislature.


Dickson was one of the first three professors hired by Dean Mason Ladd to teach when the school opened. According to Emeritus Professor Chuck Ehrhardt, Dickson taught two first-year courses: Property and Constitutional Law. Dean Ladd hired three additional faculty members, including Ehrhardt, to teach the second year of the school's existence.

"When I came to Tallahassee in the fall of '67, my office was right next to Dave Dickson's in the Longmire Building, where the law school was at that time," said Ehrhardt. "I saw Dave on a daily basis as a colleague and friend. He was there from the very beginning; he was a real significant part of our faculty, as a researcher, teacher and administrator."

Both Ehrhardt and Dean Don Weidner remember Dickson's habit of having a stack of advance sheets in his office and bringing to attention cases that may be of interest to another professor.

"Dave was always accessible, and he always had a kind word," said Weidner. "My favorite memory of Dave is sitting at his desk and pouring over advance sheets. He never failed to call to my attention cases that impacted the courses I was teaching. He was a wonderful person and colleague."

Professor Ehrhardt recalls the experience of being a part


of the first faculty of Florida State College of Law as a learning one.

"Our initial class of students didn't know for sure what they were getting into and the faculty didn't know for sure what was going to happen," said Ehrhardt. "We were all working hard and 100% of the charter class passed the bar exam. It was a great thing for the law school, the student body and the faculty. Dave was an integral part of that group that resulted in 100% passing."

According to charter-class alumnus John W. Frost, II, Dickson had a lasting impact on his students. "He was a wonderful man and truly outstanding professor," said Frost. "He was my faculty advisor and he had us all over to his house and made us feel comfortable. We were all starting a new venture with the law school just starting and he gave us insight into what to expect and made everybody feel more like family. My class is still very close and I think he was instrumental in that."

A memorial service was held at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Fernandina Beach on October 3 and a second service was held on October 17 at St. John's Episcopal Church in Tallahassee.

Judge Terry Lewis Authors Third Novel



Second Judicial Circuit Judge Terry P. Lewis ('76) isn't only successful in the legal profession, he also is an accomplished author. Judge Lewis published his third law-related mystery, *Delusional*, in 2013. The novel explores the relationship between an appointed lawyer and his paranoid

schizophrenic client, a man he once prosecuted for murder. A launch party for *Delusional* took place on September 30 in Tallahassee.


Judge Lewis, a seasoned trial judge, incorporates his two loves, writing and the law, to create novels. His first novel, *Conflict of Interest*, was published in 1997. His second book, *Privileged Information*, was published in 2003.

A man with many hobbies who thinks it's important to carve out time to do things not related directly to his job, Lewis likes the challenge associated with writing a novel. "I've always enjoyed a good mystery, especially those with a legal theme. The Perry Mason series is probably how I got interested in maybe being a lawyer. And as a lawyer, I would read novels about our profession that would drive me crazy because they were inaccurate portrayals of how things are done and I would say to myself, 'I could do something this good, maybe better.'"

Right around the time Lewis took the bench in 1989, Scott Turow came out with *Presumed Innocent*. "I remember reading Turow's book," said Lewis, "and devouring it because it was so good. Then I said to myself, 'this is how it's supposed to be done.' It inspired me to give it a try, to see if I could write something readable at least. It was a self-challenge. It took me

several years, but I completed *Conflict of Interest* and managed to find a publisher for it. I've been at it ever since.

"I got the idea for *Delusional* when I was assigned to Gadsden County, where Chattahoochee is located," said Lewis. "Cases involving residents of Florida State Hospital came through my court, and it occurred to me that it must be really weird to be mentally ill but not legally incompetent or legally insane, and to be charged with a crime. I wondered what it must be like from that perspective."

Judge Lewis has advice for other alumni interested in putting pen to paper: "All the advice out there is to write what you know but my advice is to write what you like to read, as you will be living with it for quite some time. Obviously if you write in a field that you're familiar with, it helps in terms of authenticity, giving it the feel of reality, which is important to the believability of the characters and the story."

Judge Lewis has been an active supporter of the College of Law. In March 2013, he acted as a judge during the law school's first national mock trial competition. The winning team, from

Brooklyn Law School, received a copy of Judge Lewis' first novel, in addition to the prize money. Judge Lewis also is an adjunct professor at Florida State University College of Law. He currently teaches Evidence and Florida Civil Practice.

A man who is "always working on something new," Judge Lewis is currently writing two new novels. One is in the same genre as his previous books and the other is a "historical thriller," which poses an increased challenge because of its setting in the year 1776.

Innovative Instruction: The Anatomy of a Deal

As the legal education world changes, Florida State is offering more advanced courses to prepare students for practice and to help them get jobs. Whether students are interested in litigation or in a transactional practice, there are innovative courses to help them hone their skills.

During the spring 2013 semester, students will have the opportunity to take a new transactional course: *The Anatomy of a Deal*. The course is being taught by Germaine Gurr, who is senior legal counsel for Schneider Electric – a global Fortune 500 company. Students will work through the various elements of a deal, reviewing many of the documents and provisions that transactional lawyers confront. Additionally, students will learn about how to perform due diligence, how to time transactions and closings and how to negotiate transactional documents.

“The goal of the course is to take students from start to finish through the process of a typical transaction — specifically of a typical acquisition or divestiture or joint venture, which usually are slightly more complicated than a regular commercial contract,” said Gurr. “To expand on that, from start to finish means really engaging the student in what happens — how do these conversations get started? So, when you read in *The New York Times* or *The Wall Street Journal* about AT&T going through a merger, how does that conversation begin, what happens next, who are the players, when do the lawyers get involved, what are the lawyers doing and how does it finally get accomplished?”

Because traditional law school courses are taught across the nation using the case study method, according to Gurr, many students graduate without skills they need for a transactional practice. “Someone who wants to negotiate and draft documents is going to benefit from the critical thinking and analysis that comes from the case study method, but they are going to leave without knowing how to negotiate a contract or an agreement. They won’t have those tools in their toolbox, so to speak. This class will provide them with some of those tools going forward. So when they go into a transactional practice, they have at least a general understanding of what a contract

should look like and what contracts they can expect to see.”

In addition to teaching students about drafting transactional documentation, Gurr aims to expose them to what motivates the players in a deal. “Hopefully they will gain a better understanding of how to negotiate transactions — understanding what the buyer might be thinking and what reservations a buyer would have and also gaining a better appreciation of what a seller’s concerns are.”

Although Gurr is subject to confidentiality restrictions, she hopes her background and experience on numerous transactions will benefit students. “For me, it’s been very helpful gaining knowledge from my mentors, but also through experience, to really understand why people are making a request when they are negotiating a document. If you can understand, in advance of the negotiation, what someone might be thinking or the points they are going to try to make, it really will help you better prepare for that negotiation. I will have conversations with the students on all the agreements that we go over about the different actors and what they care about.”

Bring a Client to Class!

During his summer 2013 Taxation I course, Professor Steve Johnson welcomed two attorneys and one of their clients to speak to his students. Alums Robert A. Pierce ('74), a partner at Ausley McMullen, P.A. in Tallahassee, and Steven M. Hogan ('10), an associate in the same firm, and their client Erin Ennis, who is vice president of finance for Residential Elevators, Inc., held a panel discussion and then answered questions from students. Johnson has been inviting practitioners into the classroom for many years and more recently has added clients to the equation.

"When I started inviting people to my classes, it was basically lawyers," said Johnson. "It became apparent that a vital dimension was missing – the client dimension. Law schools should help prospective lawyers understand what their clients need and want and what good client service by a lawyer involves. Lawyers have key perspectives on that, of course, but hearing it straight from a client's mouth is important too. In the panel, Ennis told our students what she looks for in a lawyer, what's good client service, and what's bad client service."

Johnson finds the attorneys also add substantial value to his lessons. "Important messages need reinforcement. When students hear the same themes from lawyers and clients as they hear in class, the ideas sink in. Beyond that, such panels give students a sense of possibilities. Many of the people that I invite are FSU alums who've gone on to do really interesting and important things. So students get the message, if they can do it, so can I. Hopefully that causes them to raise their levels of aspiration and confidence."

During the panel, Pierce and Hogan discussed working with clients and also their career paths.

"From Bob we got the perspective of the partner in charge of a client's affairs and from Steve we got the perspective of someone working for the partner who is working for the client and, in some cases, is working for the client more directly. Steve is close to the age of the students, making it easy for them to think of being in his position. Bob and Steve provided us with background on how their careers have developed and where they find their satisfactions."

Florida Bar President Visits Campus

The College of Law welcomed Florida Bar president Eugene Pettis to campus on November 13th. At an event hosted by the Black Law Students Association and Phi Alpha Delta, Pettis spoke to a packed room of students about his legal career, leadership in the community and personal ethics. Pettis, sworn in as president of The Florida Bar in June 2013, is the first African-American in the Bar's history to serve in this capacity. He is co-founder of Haliczzer Pettis & Schwamm in Fort Lauderdale, where he practices in the areas of medical malpractice, personal injury, commercial litigation and employment law.



Law School Welcomes Distinguished Federal Judges

Two distinguished federal judges visited the law school during the fall 2013 semester. The Honorable D. Brooks Smith, of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit in Philadelphia, visited in October. Judge Smith was nominated to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit by President George W. Bush on September 10, 2001, and confirmed by the U.S. Senate on July 31, 2002. He recently celebrated his 25th year on the federal bench, having also served on the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania from 1988 to 2002 (appointed by President Ronald Reagan). In 2012, U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts appointed Judge Smith to chair the Committee on Space and Facilities of the Judicial Conference of the United States for a three-year term beginning October 2013. Judge Smith has served as a member of that committee since

2006 and served on the Criminal Rules Advisory Committee of the United States Judicial Conference from 1993 to 1999. Judge Smith also serves as an adjunct professor at Penn State University Dickinson School of Law.

During his visit at Florida State, Judge Smith had breakfast with students, visited Professor Sam Wiseman's Federal Criminal Law class and met with faculty members for a discussion on the effects of sequestration on the federal bench. He also participated in a judicial clerkship panel discussion for students with an interest in clerking.

The Honorable Beverly B. Martin, of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit in Atlanta, also visited in October. President Barack Obama nominated Judge Martin to a seat on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit on June 19, 2009. The U.S. Senate confirmed her nomination unanimously (97-0) on January 20, 2010. She also served on the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Georgia from 2000 to 2010 (appointed by President Bill Clinton). Prior to her appointment to the bench, Judge Martin was U.S. Attorney for the Middle District of Georgia from 1997 to 2000. As a federal prosecutor, she served as the government's lead counsel in a variety of criminal matters, including drug conspiracy, firearms possession, and counterfeiting cases.







Dean's Annual Fundraising Report



DEAR ALUMNI AND FRIENDS:

This was a year of great success for the law school. The reputation of our outstanding students, faculty and alumni continues to blossom. Most importantly, we have the best job placement rate in the Florida and one of the best in the region.

Private fundraising made a critical difference at the law school, helping us to attract and to support the best students and faculty. Our Annual Fund has been an unprecedented success, and our new larger gifts are already making a difference.

TOTAL GIFTS AND PLEDGES

Putting annual giving and larger gifts together, we raised a cash total of \$1,154,669 and new pledges in the amount of \$1,620,000, for a grand total of \$2,774,669.

ANNUAL GIVING FROM STUDENTS AND ALUMNI

An all-time high of 30.21% of our alumni made cash gifts to the law school! Based on the latest American Bar Association data, this level of participation should keep us within the nation's top 10 law schools in terms of alumni giving rate. This level of alumni support sends a powerful signal about the enthusiasm our alumni have for the school.

This past year, 81.38% of our students contributed to our Annual Fund. Our student enthusiasm and generosity bodes well for the future. They are blazing the trail for us all!

LARGER GIFTS

This past year, we received cash payments on Larger Gifts totaling \$632,573 and new pledges on Larger Gifts in the amount of \$1,575,000, for a grand total of \$2,207,573. Endowed Gift Opportunities

ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS

Our single greatest need from private giving is endowed scholarships. To continue to serve our mission of providing access to all, including those from families of modest means, we will need significantly more scholarships. Scholarships are awarded according to the intent of the donor and can be based on merit, need or other factors.

The minimum gift needed to endow a scholarship at Florida State University College of Law is \$25,000.

ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIPS AND CHAIRS

A 2012 update of *Leiter's Law School Rankings* rated our faculty 33rd best in the country in terms of per capita scholarly impact. Our faculty members are being recruited by some of the nation's most prominent law schools. Professorships and chairs give us the merit money we need to retain our top faculty.

Endowed professorships and chairs provide salary supplements based on merit. Faculty members are appointed for five-year terms, with renewal contingent on continued scholarly productivity. The appointee bears the name of the donor or the donor's designee.

The minimum gift needed to endow a professorship at Florida State University College of Law is \$200,000. The minimum gift needed to endow a chair at Florida State Law is \$1,000,000.



ENDOWMENTS FOR EXCELLENCE

Endowments for Excellence leave it to the discretion of the school how to spend income earned on endowment.

The minimum gift needed to create an Endowment for Excellence is \$25,000.

DONOR RECOGNITION

We are delighted to recognize scholarships, professorships and other targeted gifts by naming them in honor of the donor or the donor's designee. In addition, we are pleased to acknowledge inter vivos gifts of \$200,000 or more with an oil portrait of the donor or the donor's designee that will be displayed in a prominent place at the law school.

The new Advocacy Center and the renovated spaces in Roberts Hall give us many new rooms to name to thank donors for gifts ranging from \$25,000 to \$5 million.

Recent Larger Gifts

We would like to specially thank those of you who made a larger gift commitment between July 1, 2012 and June 30, 2013. These gifts make it possible to continue the dynamic advancement of the academic programs and reputation of the law school.

\$1 MILLION OR MORE

John W. Frost, II ('69) has made a pledge over time of **\$1 million**. John's \$1 million gift will be divided to increase the two endowments he first created. Fully 60% will be used to supplement the **John W. Frost, II Moot Court Endowment** and 40% will be used to supplement the **John W. and Ashley E. Frost Endowed Professorship**, currently and importantly occupied by Professor and Moot Court Faculty Advisor Nat Stern. This is John's fourth major gift to endowment. In 1994, John became the first alum to give the law school \$100,000. He did so to establish the John W. and Ashley E. Frost Endowed Professorship. That gift was followed in 2000 by another \$100,000 gift to establish the John W. Frost, II Moot Court Endowment. In 2004, John supplemented the professorship with a gift of \$100,000. John has also made other significant gifts to support the law school's Annual Fund Scholarships and the William and Catherine VanDer creek Professorship. In recognition of John's additional gift, the law school named the former First District Court of Appeal Courtroom in the Advocacy Center the **John W. Frost, II Courtroom**. This naming is another first for John because it is the first courtroom in the Advocacy Center to be sponsored. The annual distribution from the endowment shall be used to recruit or retain an exceptionally productive faculty member in business law, with a preference toward a faculty member with expertise in federal income tax law. Steve is the Chairman of International Spirits, LLC in Ponte Vedra Beach.



2012-2013 Total Cash and New Pledges Received: \$2,774,669*



2012-2013 New Pledges by Purpose: \$1,620,000




2012-2013 Cash Received by Purpose \$1,154,669*





Professor Annino Receives \$50,000 Award For PILC Project

The Miller Resentencing Project, an initiative of the Public Interest Law Center's (PILC) Children in Prison Project, has won the American College of Trial Lawyers' 2013 Emil Gumpert Award. This nationally competitive award recognizes public or private programs "whose principal purpose is to maintain and improve the administration of justice."


On September 11, members of the American College of Trial Lawyers were in Tallahassee to present the \$50,000 check associated with the award. Glass Professor of Public Interest Law Paolo Annino accepted the award in the College of Law's John W. Frost, II Courtroom. In October, Annino was honored on behalf of the project in San Francisco during the American College of Trial Lawyers' 2013 annual meeting.

The Miller Resentencing Project focuses on Florida children serving mandatory life sentences who were juveniles at the time of the crime. In *Miller v. Alabama*, 132 S. Ct. 2455 (2012), the Court ruled that a mandatory life sentence without the possibility of parole in homicide cases are unconstitutional for juvenile cases. Professor Annino and his students are waiting on a decision by the Florida Supreme Court to decide if *Miller* will be applied retroactively.

"The Miller project is an outgrowth of our Children in Prison Project that began in 1997," said Annino. "The goal of this project has always been research and advocacy."

Eric D. Schab, a 2013 graduate of the Florida State University College of Law, was hired as a graduate fellow to assist the Public Interest Law Center with the resentencing project. During the check presentation, Schab explained what PILC hopes to achieve as a result of winning the award: first, for all 207 children currently serving unconstitutional sentences to have counsel and second, to ensure that PILC is in touch with qualified experts so each case can receive individual assessments at time of resentencing.

Robert P. MacKenzie, III, a fellow in the American Col-

lege of Trial Lawyers who visited Florida State during the award selection process, was in Tallahassee for the check presentation. "It's easy to ignore this segment of the population (children in prison) and the fact is, Professor Annino and his students embraced them," said MacKenzie. "He also did it with such a passion. That's what I remember about coming to Florida State for my (site) visit, just sensing the excitement and the passion and the dedication that he had with the students; they didn't want to quit."

For Annino, the award signals recognition of the hard work his students have been doing in Florida. "We are very grateful for the American College of Trial Lawyers for their support and honored to receive the Emil Gumpert award," said Annino. "In many ways, they are the finest trial lawyers in both the U.S. and Canada."

Chilton Davis Varner, president of the American College of Trial Lawyers, said Professor Annino's experience was a major factor in giving the award to the Miller Resentencing Project. "Professor Annino has a proven track record," said Varner. "He knows how to get things done and has a remarkable history of executing on good intentions. Lots of people want things to be better, he makes them better."

Executive Assistant U.S. Attorney of the Eastern District of Pennsylvania Robert K. Reed served as panel moderator. Reed explained his role and his relationship with Sawyer.

“Not long after meeting and working with El, he said to me that one of his dreams was to make a film that would explain for people coming out of prison the real challenges and obstacles they will face when they come out,” said Reed. “It felt like a lot of people coming out have unrealistic expectations. El did not know of any success stories and he wanted people to understand that there are success stories. El wanted ex-offenders to understand that they are able to change their lives, to change their thinking and to change their approach.”

Federal District Court Judge Mark E. Walker (whose parents served homemade cookies at a reception following the event) explained the need to develop better solutions for

ex-offenders.

“If you are a convicted felon and you don’t have a job, you don’t even have an I.D. when you get out of prison, then it is difficult at best to successfully reenter society,” said Walker. “We want to create bridges back into the community and in so doing, not only do we help those prisoners become successful members of our community but we protect the community and save money by reducing recidivism.”

Easing an ex-prisoner’s transition back into society is important to reducing recidivism, according to Pamela C. Marsh. “It’s our responsibility to help ex-offenders become successful, productive citizens and not go back to jail and to not create more victims in the community by committing a new crime,” said Marsh.

The film was screened in Pensacola two days before coming to Tallahassee. Judge Rodgers and Pensacola Mayor Ashton Hayward are involved with Reentry Alliance Pensacola, a community-based organization that conceived of the idea to screen the film in Tallahassee.

“The idea was to bring this film to Pensacola and Tallahassee because it’s a very powerful depiction of the obstacles and challenges that ex-offenders face when they come out of prison,” said Judge Rodgers. “We wanted to engage the community in a dialogue about these issues. We certainly didn’t think we would solve all the problems here today with the showing of the film but we wanted to create an awareness of the problem.”

Record Thirty Percent of Alumni Give to Law School



Florida State Ranked Nation's 9th Best Value Law School



BEST VALUE LAW SCHOOLS

They may not be the high-gloss law schools in the nation's largest cities, but they do something else: get graduates jobs and don't saddle them with big debt.

"HEN FIGURE OVER?" and "low degree" have almost become expressions. Catch the new and you go in the neighborhood of \$100,000. But a law degree doesn't necessarily come with the body of a prize pig. In one annual list of Best Value Law Schools, only four of the 51 schools have median debt scores greater than \$100,000.

The University of Alabama School of Law — second on the list — had a debt below \$60,000. Law schools are not equal. Some provide exceptional pricing, while others offer an opportunity to earn the greater of law or do something better than most and place graduates in the work force at a smaller percentage.

Like beauty, it's in the eye of the beholder.

Once again, the National Jurist magazine has identified which of its research law schools offer the best value. We analyze enrollment, cost of living, tuition, bar passage rates, debt accumulation and — most important — employment success. Check out our page 26 for methodology.

For the second year in a row, the University of Alabama School of Law came out on top in our analysis. A good number of schools in last year's top 20 remain in this year's ranking, even though

some have changed positions slightly, showing they deliver value — at least through our analysis — consistently.

The University of Alabama led all law schools on our list with a weighted employment rate of nearly 90 percent. The University of California, Irvine School of Law had the highest at nearly 82 percent.

The weighting employment weights that recent law school graduates are going through have been well documented. Indeed, they remain strong. That's why the employment success by school is given our highest weight — 35 percent — when it comes to the study. The negative growth in employment the most value, which has been well documented, has been dropped.

It is no surprise on so that employers have taken notice and found our graduates to be a desirable group as law," said Thomas Karkhanavich, assistant dean for career services at the University of Alabama. "And we know that by helping realize as law as possible, we're enabling our graduates to pursue the careers that they want, even if it's in a sector that doesn't meet with high of starting salary."

Employment: the key to success

This year, there are a number of new schools that ranked in the Value list (20). The University of South Carolina School of Law ranked first. The place law went to 19th place this year. The reason? The weighted employment rate rose from 72 percent in 2011 to 82 percent last year.

The University of South Carolina law school has been reconstituted by the

done better in the employment category for several reasons, said Robert Whelan, the dean. For one, the economy is improving in South Carolina a little bit faster than the rest of the nation. Secondly, the school has beefed up its career services office to give students more one-on-one guidance when it comes to job searches.

"We try to make them do as much as a free intern and not relying on an on-campus job."

The school has also brought more judges over the school to interact with the students and better prepare them for judicial challenges. Finally, the school placed a greater emphasis on its writing program — a skill that is in demand for many attorneys.

College of Law Ranked Fifth Best in Nation for Hispanic Students

Hispanic Business magazine has named Florida State University College of Law the fifth best law school in the nation for Hispanic students. This is the tenth year in a row that the College of Law has been named one of the top 10 law schools for Hispanic students. The 2013 rankings were released September 12.

The magazine based its rankings on Hispanic student enrollment, Hispanic faculty members, Hispanic student retention rates, degrees conferred to Hispanics, progressive programs aimed at increasing enrollment of Hispanic students and school reputation as reflected in *U.S. News & World Report*.

"We are all thrilled to once again be named in the *Hispanic Business* top 10," said Dean Don Weidner. "The Hispanic dimensions of our school make a more dynamic environment for everyone."

The National Jurist magazine has ranked Florida State the ninth best value law school in the nation. The ranking, published in *The National Jurist's* October 2013 issue, weighs important student outcomes — bar passage rate and employment rate — against tuition, cost of living and indebtedness. According to *The National Jurist*, the rankings are "designed to find the law schools where graduates have excellent chances of passing the bar and getting a legal job, without taking on a ton of debt." Florida State is the only law school in Florida ranked in the top 20. This is the fifth year in a row that *The National Jurist* has ranked Florida State one of the nation's top 15 best value law schools.

The national ranking reflects the law school's strong student outcomes. For 10 of the last 16 administrations of the Florida Bar Examination, Florida State's bar passage rate was either first or second among Florida's 11 law schools. Additionally, according to American Bar Association data, Florida State is one of the nation's best law schools, and Florida's best, in terms of the percentage of 2012 graduates employed nine months after graduation in full-time, long-term, Bar passage-required or J.D.-advantage jobs.

"We are thrilled to again be ranked one of the nation's best value law schools, especially because job placement is the highest weighted factor in this ranking," said Dean Don Weidner. "Launching the careers of our students is the most important thing we do."
