Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 316.6135, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

316.6135 Leaving children unattended or unsupervised in motor vehicle; penalty; authority of law enforcement officer.--

- (1) No parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for a child younger than 6 years of age shall leave such child unattended or unsupervised in a motor vehicle for a period in excess of 15 minutes; however, no such person shall leave a child unattended for any period of time if the motor of the vehicle is running or the health of the child is in danger.
- (2) Any person who violates the provisions of subsection (1) is guilty of a noncriminal traffic infraction, punishable by a fine of:
 - (a) Not more than \$100; or
- (b) Not less than \$50 and not more than \$500 if the motor of the vehicle was running or the health of the child is in danger at the time of the violation.
- (3) Any law enforcement officer who observes a child left unattended or unsupervised in a motor vehicle in violation of subsection (1) may use whatever means are reasonably necessary to protect the minor child and to remove him from the vehicle.
- (4) If the child is removed from the immediate area notification should be placed on the vehicle.

(5) The child shall be remanded to the custody of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services pursuant to chapter 39, unless the law enforcement officer is able to locate the parents or legal guardian or other person responsible for the child.

- (7) MISCELLANEOUS EXEMPTIONS. --
- (a) Religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and veterans' institutions and organizations.--
- 1. There are exempt from the tax imposed by part I of this chapter transactions involving:

SB 49 by Senator Kiser

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I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

Section 316.1975, F.S., requires the operator of a motor vehicle, other than a licensed vehicle making deliveries, to stop the engine, lock the ignition and remove the key before leaving his vehicle unattended. There is no current provision prohibiting the leaving of a child unattended in a motor vehicle.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill prohibits the parent, legal guardian or other person responsible for a child younger than nine from leaving the child unattended or unsupervised in a parked car for more than five minutes. If the motor vehicle's motor is running, the child may not be left unattended or unsupervised for any period of time. Law enforcement officers who observe a violation of the provisions of this bill are authorized to take custody of the child for the purpose of returning him to the parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for the child. Any person violating the provisions of the bill is guilty of a noncriminal traffic infraction and is subject to a fine of not more than \$100 or, if the vehicle's motor was running at the time of the violation, a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$500.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

Public:

Those persons found to have violated the provisions of the bill will be subject to the fine set forth.

B. Government:

Local governments will receive the proceeds of the fines imposed for violations but the amount of such revenue is not known. The extent to which enforcement of the provisions of the bill will increase costs to law enforcement agencies is also not known.

III. COMMENTS:

The bill does not indicate how a determination of the five minute time period is to be made. A law enforcement officer could have to observe a child in a parked vehicle for the full five minute period before being able to take action.

I. <u>SUMMARY:</u> This bill provides that leaving a child under 9 years of age unattended or unsupervised in a motor vehicle is a noncriminal traffic infraction.

There is currently no provision in the traffic control statute (Ch. 316) that prohibits the leaving of a child unattended in a motor vehicle.

The bill creates s. 316.6135, F.S. prohibiting the parent, legal guardian or other person responsible for a child under the age of 9 years from leaving the child unattended or unsupervised in a parked car for more than 5 minutes. If the vehicle's motor is running, the child may not be left unattended or unsupervised for any length of time. Any person violating this provision is guilty of a noncriminal traffic infraction and is subject to a fine of not more than \$100 or, if the vehicle's motor was running at the time of the violation, a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$500.

Law enforcement officers who observe a violation of this provision are authorized to take custody of the child for the purpose of returning him to the parent, legal quardian, or other person responsible for the child.

Child safety; prohibiting the leaving of a child unattended in an automobile SB 49 by Senator Kiser

REFERENCE

I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

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1483

Section 316.1975, F.S., requires the operator of a motor vehicle, other than a licensed vehicle making deliveries, to stop the engine, lock the ignition and remove the key before leaving his vehicle unattended. There is no current provision prohibiting the leaving of a child unattended in a motor vehicle.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill prohibits the parent, legal guardian or other person responsible for a child younger than nine from leaving the child unattended or unsupervised in a parked car for more than five minutes. If the motor vehicle's motor is running, the child may not be left unattended or unsupervised for any period of time. Law enforcement officers who observe a violation of the provisions of this bill are authorized to take custody of the child for the purpose of returning him to the parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for the child. Any person violating the provisions of the bill is guilty of a noncriminal traffic infraction and is subject to a fine of not more than \$100 or, if the vehicle's motor was running at the time of the violation, a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$500.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

A. Public:

Those persons found to have violated the provisions of the bill will be subject to the fine set forth.

B. Government:

Local governments will receive the proceeds of the fines imposed for violations but the amount of such revenue is not known. The extent to which enforcement of the provisions of the bill will increase costs to law enforcement agencies is also not known.

III. COMMENTS:

The bill does not indicate how a determination of the five minute time period is to be made. A law enforcement officer could have to observe a child in a parked vehicle for the full five minute period before being able to take action.
