I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

Currently, chapter 943, F.S., establishes the Division of Criminal Justice Information Systems within the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE), and sets forth the division's duties. s. 943.05, F.S. This division maintains a system which collects, stores, and disseminates essential criminal justice information to federal, state, and local agencies. Recently, the division developed new uniform offense and arrest report forms, as required by statute, for use at the local level and to assist the division in meeting its obligations for federal reporting of crime data. At this time, however, neither of those reports requires information indicating whether or not an offense was gang related.

Chapter 943 also creates the Division of Local Law Enforcement Assistance within FDLE, which houses the Florida Intelligence Center (FIC), a support bureau designed to provide intelligence support to law enforcement agencies. This support may include assisting law enforcement by supplying intelligence information on youth gang activity.

In 1988, FDLE conducted a survey to collect youth gang data and related information from local law enforcement agencies. A report was published, based on survey results, which documents the numbers of gangs and gang members and their geographic boundaries, as reported by individual agencies. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Youth Gangs in Florida (December, 1988). This report, however, represents the only compilation of statewide gang information at this time.

At the local level, some individual law enforcement agencies collect gang data on their own initiative for their specific jurisdictions.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

SB 1272 would require the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) to establish an advisory group of law enforcement representatives from state law enforcement agencies to develop a plan to create and implement a statewide youth gang data base.

Specifically, the advisory group would be directed to identify and define the necessary data elements, to develop a working methodology for the collection, storage, and dissemination of data on a statewide basis, and to develop a strategy for implementation of the data base.

Further, the advisory group would be required to issue a final report with recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature by January 1, 1990.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

A. Public:

None.

B. Government:

According to FDLE, passage of SB 1272 would result in an estimated fiscal impact of \$9,000, representing travel expenses for the youth gang advisory group.

In addition, there may be a future fiscal impact on the department when the advisory group finalizes recommendations regarding implementation of a statewide youth gang data base. If FDLE should be designated as the central repository and reporting agency for this information, four additional positions would be required at an estimated cost of \$120,402.

III. COMMENTS:

IV. AMENDMENTS:

#1 by Judiciary-Criminal: Expands the legislative mandate for development of a statewide data base on youth gangs to also include information on street gang activity. Provides that members of the law enforcement advisory group may be entitled to per diem as well as travel expenses.

I. SUMMARY:

This bill requires the Department of Law Enforcement to establish an advisory group of law enforcement officials to develop a plan to create and implement a statewide youth gang data base.

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Currently, Chapter 943, F.S., creates the divisions of the Department of Law Enforcement and their responsibilities. The Division of Criminal Justice Information Systems maintains a system which collects, stores, and disseminates essential criminal justice information to state and local criminal justice agencies. In 1987 and 1988, the department developed a forced-choice uniform offense report and arrest report, both of which must meet statutory criteria, for use at the local level and to assist the department in its obligations for federal reporting of crime data. However, neither of these reports provide for information indicating whether or not the offense or offender was gang related.

In 1988, the Department of Law Enforcement conducted a survey collecting youth gang data and information from local agencies which resulted in a report, FDLE Youth Gangs in Florida, December 1988. This report documents the numbers of gangs and gang members, and their geographic boundaries as reported by individual agencies. However, this is the only statewide information available at this time. The Division of Local Law Enforcement Assistance collects, analyzes, stores, and disseminates crime specific intelligence data for use by local law enforcement agencies during investigative efforts. 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individual law enforcement agencies collect gang data on their own initiative for their specific jurisdiction. However, the state does not solicit specific information on youth gang members and activities.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

HB 860 directs the Department of Law Enforcement to form an advisory group of law enforcement officials for the purpose of developing a specific methodology and implementation plan for a statewide data base on youth gangs.

C. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

Section 1.

This section provides legislative intent regarding the need for a youth gang data base and illustrates some of the types of information which would be useful for the development of policy, the implementation of programmatic strategies, and law enforcement tactics.

This section also directs the Department of Law Enforcement to form an advisory group to identify the necessary data elements, to operationally define these data elements, to develop a methodology for the collection, storage, and dissemination of data on a statewide basis, and to develop a strategy for the implementation of the data base. The strategy for the implementation of the data base will include the specific mechanics and costs of implementing a data base that will be an on-line data base available to agencies throughout the state to assist in their duties and to provide the department with data for reporting purposes.

The Department of Law Enforcement will issue a report and make final recommendations to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate, and the Governor by January 1, 1990. The number of members to be included on the advisory group is not provided in the legislation in an effort to allow the department flexibility to ensure statewide representation. The members will be individuals representing the local law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

The advisory group members will not be compensated for serving, however, they will be entitled for reimbursement for travel expenses incurred while serving as members.

Section 2.

This section provides that this act will take effect July 1, 1989, or upon becoming law, whichever occurs later.

- A. FISCAL IMPACT ON STATE AGENCIES/STATE FUNDS:
 - 1. Non-recurring or First Year Start-Up Effects:

It is anticipated that the fiscal impact of this legislation resulting from travel expenses of the advisory members will be insignificant. The department indicates that the provisions in this legislation could be implemented within existing resources and positions. There will be some travel expenses incurred by the advisory group and the department estimates that the travel expenses (per diem) of the advisory group would be less than \$20,000.

2. Recurring or Annualized Continuation Effects:

There will be a future fiscal impact when the advisory group makes a recommendation regarding the specifics of implementing a statewide youth gang data base. These costs will be specified in the final report of the advisory group and would related to future implementing legislation.

3. Long Run Effects Other Than Normal Growth:

The long run effects of this legislation would include more effective investigatory tools for local agencies which might lead to a savings in resources.

4. Appropriations Consequences:

The travel expenses of the advisory group is estimated to be less than \$20,000.
