Parking Violations/Outstanding; authorizes counties to send computer tapes to H.S.M.V. Dept. listing names of persons with 3 or more outstanding parking violations; requires dept. to flag registration records of such persons. Amends 316.1967. Effective Date: 10/01/89.

I. SUMMARY:

This bill authorizes counties to send computer tapes to the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles listing the names of persons with three or more outstanding parking violations. Requires the department to mark the appropriate registration records of persons so reported.

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Currently, s. 316.1967(6), F.S., provides that any county may provide by ordinance that the clerk of the court or the traffic violations bureau shall supply the tax collector and license tag agents within said county, monthly, with an alphabetized list of persons who have five or more outstanding parking violations.

Pursuant to s. 320.03(8), F.S., if an applicant's name appears on the list referred to in s. 316.1967(6), F.S., no license plate or revalidation sticker shall be issued until such person's name no longer appears on said list or until he presents a receipt from the clerk showing that his parking fines have been paid. The tax collector and the clerk of the court are each entitled to receive monthly, 10 percent of the civil penalties and fines recovered from such persons.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Section 316.1967(6), F.S., is amended to state that any county may provide by ordinance that the clerk of the court or the traffic violations bureau shall supply the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles with a magnetically encoded computer

tape reel or cartridge listing persons who have three or more outstanding parking violations. Such reel or cartridge shall be machine readable by the installed computer system at the department. The department shall mark the appropriate registration records of persons so reported. The provisions of s. 320.03(8), F.S., shall apply to each person whose name appears on such list and no license plate or revalidation sticker shall be issued.

SB 457 by

I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

Section 316.1967(6), F.S., authorizes counties to provide by ordinance for the clerk of the court or the traffic violations bureau to supply the county tax collector and license tag agents with a monthly list of persons who have five or more outstanding parking violations.

Section 320.03(8), F.S., provides that no license plate or revalidation sticker may be issued to a person whose name appears on a list pursuant to s. 316.1967(6), F.S., until such person's name no longer appears on said list or until he presents a receipt from the clerk showing that his parking fines have been paid. The tax collector and the clerk of the court are each entitled to receive monthly, as costs for implementing and administering the program, 10 percent of the civil penalties and fines recovered from such persons.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 316.1967(6), F.S., is amended to authorize a new procedure for the collection of unpaid parking tickets. Counties would be authorized to provide by ordinance for the clerk of the court or the traffic violations bureau to supply the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles with a magnetically encoded computer tape reel or cartridge that is machine readable by the installed computer systems at the department, listing persons who have three or more outstanding parking violations. The department would be required to flag the appropriate registration records of individuals so reported.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

A. Public:

Persons who have three or more outstanding parking violations would be required, if the county in which the violations occurred adopts an appropriate ordinance, to satisfy the violations prior to registering any vehicle in this state. Currently, similar procedures apply to persons who have five or more outstanding parking violations.

B. Government:

The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles estimates that the following additional resources would be required to administer the provisions of this bill:
