I. SUMMARY:

This bill directs the Secretary of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services to conduct a study of accidental death and injury in children. An advisory committee of persons with expertise in child safety is to assist the department with this study. The department is to report the committee's recommendations by February 1 1990. Funding for the study is to be appropriated from the Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund in the amount of \$50,000.

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Currently, accidental deaths and injuries to children are not addressed as a comprehensive statewide program. Today, preventable injuries claim more children's lives than any other cause including crime, violence and illness. Injury is one of our most expensive public health problems, nationally the direct and indirect cost is \$75-100 billion annually. Florida's children are at a higher risk of accidental death and injury than children in many other states. Drowning and near drowning in Florida children ages 1-4 not only leads the nation on a per capita basis, it is on the rise. The cost of just one severely brain injured child during a lifetime is estimated at \$4 million. In addition, the estimated cost for pedestrian and bicycle injuries in Florida, 1986, was \$342 million. Although the consequences of childhood injury are a major health care concern in Florida, a comprehensive, statewide program for monitoring and surveillance of injuries has not been attempted to date.

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B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The committee substitute requires the assembly of a committee of experts in child safety. Individuals from the areas of pediatrics, injury epidemiology, education, public health, nursing, homicide, pedestrian/bicycle safety, Red Cross, immunization, poison control and consumers groups will convene for the purpose of developing recommendations by February 1, 1990.

The Secretary of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services would report these recommendations for future legislation. Recommendations would be specific for the areas of: additions and revisions to Florida laws, the need for safety education and its implementation, the need for a central approach for surveillance and data collection, and the effectiveness of treatment once an accident has occurred.

Injury and death due to accidents have long been recognized as a public health problem. On the national level Dr. Everett Koop has established a Safe Kids Campaign which is an effort to make the environment "safer for every kid in America."

The most preventable injuries of children are: (1) bicycle/pedestrian accidents; traveling as a passenger in a car, and drowning. Florida leads the nation on a per capita basis in all three of these categories.

In 1986 the American Association of Poison Centers stated "approximately 92% of the poisoning exposures occur at home with 47% occurring in children less than 3 years old". Florida's Poison Control Center in Tampa reported an 8% increase in 1987, for the number of calls it received in 1986 totaling more than 55,000.

This bill is consistent with the Mission Statement of the Committee on Health Care in that the study committee would identify potential delivery systems to increase access to care for children and decrease the cost of medical care through preventive intervention.
