I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

Section 370.102, F.S., currently preempts to the state the power to regulate the taking or possession of saltwater fish, as defined in s. 370.01, F.S., 1988 Supplement.

Section 125.01, F.S., 1988 Supplement, currently provides that a county government shall not have the power to regulate the taking or possession of saltwater fish, as defined in s. 370.01, 1988 Supplement, with respect to the method of taking, size, number, season, or species.

At least one local government interprets such provisions as prohibiting a local government from regulating the act of fishing in saltwater from real property owned by a local government. Because some properties, primarily bridges, may not be designed in a manner that allows safe fishing without interferring with traffic flow, a local government may wish to prohibit fishing from such properties as a public safety measure. Several injuries and at least one death have resulted from fishing from such properties.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill amends s. 370.102, F.S., to specify that state preemption of the power to regulate saltwater fishing does not prohibit a local government from prohibiting saltwater fishing from real property owned by the local government, for reasons of protecting the public health, safety, or welfare.

The bill also amends s. 125.01(4), F.S., 1988 Supplement, to clarify that the prohibition of a county's power to regulate the taking or possession of saltwater fish does not prohibit a county from prohibiting the act of saltwater fishing from real property owned by the county, for reasons of protecting the public health, safety, or welfare.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

A. Public:

The bill has no measureable impact on the public.

B. Government:

While the bill has no measureable impact on government, there could be an undeterminable benefit to local governments if the bill results in fewer injuries on local government property and thus a reduction in potential exposure to liability.

This bill specifically authorizes local governments to prohibit, for reasons of protecting public health, safety, or welfare, saltwater fishing from property owned by that local government.
