I. SUMMARY:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Camp Blanding was acquired in 1954, but the armory was not constructed until 1984. The armory is known, and has heretofore been referred to, as the Camp Blanding Armory.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The Camp Blanding Armory will be named the Major General Kennedy C. Bullard Armory.

C. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

Section 1. Names the Camp Blanding armory the Major General Kennedy C. Bullard Armory, and directs the Department of Military Affairs to erect suitable markers.

Section 2. Provides that this act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

I. SUMMARY:

A. Present Situation:

Chapter 250, F.S., sets forth the Military Code for the State of Florida, and establishes the Florida Department of Military Affairs, which is comprised of the military forces of the state. The Organized Militia of the state are the Florida National Guard and other organized military forces as authorized by law. The Florida National Guard is governed by concurrent laws of the federal and state governments.

Camp Blanding is one of five military installations in Florida where active day-to-day operations take place. The camp, which was deeded to the state in 1954 to be used for military purposes, is located in Clay County. An armory was constructed in 1984, and is known as the Camp Blanding Armory.

Major General Kennedy C. Bullard is a former Adjutant General of Florida, and served in that capacity from 1975 until his retirement in 1981. Major General Bullard's military service spans 42 years. He received many decorations and awards for distinguished service, including the Bronze Star and Purple Heart, the United States Army Meritorious Service Medal, the Florida Cross, the Florida Distinguished Service Medal, the National Guard Association of the United States Distinguished Service Medal, the Humanitarian Service Medal, the Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation, and the National Governor's Association Legion of Merit.

Section 267.062, F.S., provides in part that no state building shall be named for any living person, except as specifically provided by law.

B. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The armory at Camp Blanding would be named the Major General Kennedy C. Bullard Armory. The Department of Military Affairs would be directed to erect suitable markers on the armory designating the armory by its legal name.

II. ECONOMIC IMPACT AND FISCAL NOTE:

The Department of Military Affairs estimates the cost to erect appropriate markers designating the building to be \$2,000.
